(Continued from page nine) to the continued holding of the Intercolonial, and would be prepared to hand it over to some railway company on fair and reasonable terms. Every Minister of Railways he had known, had tried to figure out a surplus and they had figured it out in words only. It had been absolutely a losing game ever since it had been started. "Let us get rid of the incubus," he said.

Mr. A. K. MacLean protested against this doctrine, saying that the Intercolonial exercised a check on the working of other railways.

After some further discussion Mr. Cochrane moved that the committee rise and report progress.

The bill to advance \$3,500,000.00 to the Quebec Harbor Commissioners was read a second time. That amending the Quebec Harbor Commissioners Act 1899, was read a second time and put through committee.

Two forty-five a.m. EXPRESS RATES IN WESTERN CANADA CUT 20 PER CENT.

OTTAWA, Ont., April 23.—A 20 per cent. reduction in express rates in the West, with rates in the East left alone for the present, till the board has obtained further information as to the working out of the reductions formerly made, is the sense of a unanimous judgment issued this morning by the Railway Commission.

A rearrangement of Canadian Express rates was made some years ago by the board under the late Judge Mabey. Last autumn the commissioner took the matter up again, and the present twenty page judgment is the result.
