### MISERLY WIFE

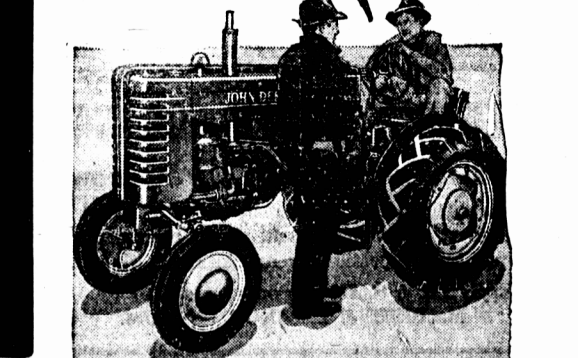
