Wartime Controls Upheld By Supreme Court

OTTAWA, Jan. 5 (CP)—The Supreme Court of Canada today upheld the powers of Federal Government wartime economic controllers in a judgment on a reference in which the constitutionality of the War Control Act was questioned.

The Court was asked two questions designed to form a test case for all wartime controls. The first was whether the War Control Act, which gave the government power to regulate the production of goods, was ultra vires. The answer was "no," except for paragraph 4 which was found ultra vires. That paragraph deals with compensation for equipment taken over by the chemical controller.

The second question, answered with an unqualified "no," asked if the War Control Act was ultra vires. The six judges who heard the reference were unanimous in their conclusions but each wrote his own reasons for them.

The reference to the Supreme Court by Justice Minister St. Laurent took the chemical control as a typical example of controlling wartime economy.

The reference asked whether regulations in relation to chemicals dated July 10, 1941, were ultra vires of the Federal Government, either in whole or in part, and, if so, in what particular or particulars and to what extent.

On Jan. 10, 1942, regulations respecting glycerine was also placed before the Court with the inquiry as to whether it was ultra vires of the controller of chemicals either in whole or in part.

Through decisions on these points the government sought to establish beyond question the legality of orders-in-council appointing wartime economic controllers and of the powers vested in such controllers.
