JACKSON, Ky., Dec. 30—The Christmas Day mob here which took Chester Fugate, 25, slayer of Clay Watkins, from the county jail, shot him fourteen times and left him to die in the snow, is believed to be the outcropping of a feud between the Fugate and Watkins families of several years standing. Members of the mob were masked.

Deputy Sheriff Green Watkins, a brother of Clay Watkins, was slain by Amos Fugate, Chester's cousin, an escaped convict, in 1926.
