FUNERAL ON TUESDAY—The remains of the late Mrs. John Agnew, whose death occurred at Orangeville, Ontario on Friday, will arrive in Charlottetown this evening, accompanied by her two daughters, Mrs. Alvin Hansauld and Miss Amy Agnew. The body will be taken to the MacLeen Funeral Home and tomorrow morning will be removed to the residence of Mrs. T. F. Fullerton, 7 Greenfield Avenue, where private service will be held at noon. Public funeral service will be in St. James Church at 2.30.

Impoverished drift-ice in Northumberland Strait for nearly six days, the schooner "Mabone" professor "Mabone" was moored at the Marine Wharf, Charlottetown last night. The icebreaker C. G. S. "Montcalm" reached the 89-foot vessel with Captain Harry Brown and his two sons, Clarence and Allison, all of Victoria, P. E. I., aboard, Saturday night and yesterday morning broke through about 10 inches of ice to port followed by the "Mabone" under her own power.

A large crowd gathered along the waterfront when word spread the Mabone was in port. After escorting the vessel here a fire-boat was sent with blasts from its siren, which was answered by the Mabone and the Rocky Point Ferry "Fairview", before proceeding to Bird Rock where the lighthouse keeper will be taken off. The Montcalm will then sail for Sydney, N. S.

On Sunday, Dec. 12th, after a brief illness, Mr. Frederick W. Reeves passed peacefully away at his home in Freetown. He was 60 years of age and was the son of the late Thomas Reeves and his wife Mary Sullivan.

The dwelling of Ira Clark, Union Road, was completely destroyed by fire early Saturday. Damage was estimated at \$2,500, partly covered by insurance.

No one was in the house at the time the fire broke out. The flames were believed to have originated near the furnace. Mrs. Clark and her young child were in Charlottetown at the time.

The fire was discovered by Mr. Clark who found the place filled with smoke when he arrived home from his visit. Neighbors quickly gathered, but the flames had gained much headway and their efforts were fruitless. Smoke prevented the saving of furniture in the building.

The death occurred at Orangeville, Ontario, Friday, January 7th of Agnes Ireland, widow of the late Hon. John Agnew, former Speaker of the Legislative Assembly.

Mrs. Agnew was born at Alberton, and there the family resided for a number of years before they removed to Charlottetown. She was a woman of many fine qualities of mind and heart and had made many warm friends in this city and the western part of the province.

NARROW ESCAPE — Don and Kenneth MacKay and Mabon Byrn had a narrow escape from drowning when they broke through ice while skating in the dark on Webster Marchbank's pond at Mill Valley. They failed to notice an opening in the ice and plunged into about eight feet of water. Don MacKay was able to get out but the other two were assisted by their brother to safety. The two brothers then hauled Byrn out.

Direct relief had cost the City approximately \$5,000 since it was started last month. Coun. G. W. McLeod, chairman of the finance committee, informed the City Council at the regular monthly meeting last night. Of that amount \$2,200 had been for coal. The figures included what had been spent in December and to date in January.

Purchase of a Fargo truck with Sargent plow complete, attached at a cost of \$3,270 from F. R. McLaine was decided on by the Council. The machine would be used for clearing city streets of snow and, as the plow is detachable, the truck can be used for regular city trucking. The present small plow had outlived its usefulness to a great extent. Coun. A. A. Hennessey, chairman of the street committee, said. Heavier equipment was necessary to keep streets open during snow storms to permit passage of fire trucks. Purchase of the truck was on a tender basis.

The tender of A. Pickard & Co. for 50 tons of slack coal, Indian Cove, at \$5.85 per ton delivered, for the Market Building and Library was accepted. The supplying of the City Building was equally divided between D. D. Gillis & Co., A. Pickard & Co., Lyons & Co. and H. R. Large & Co. The price was \$8.00 per ton delivered.
