STEAMER IN ICE.—A large steamer supposed to be the Gaspesia, was seen in the ice about six miles off St. Peter's Island yesterday, slowly making her way down the strait.

THE STEAMERS.—The Carriery made the trip from Tormentine to Borden yesterday and will leave this side on schedule time this morning, the train leaving Charlottetown at 6 o'clock. The mails will arrive by train from Borden tonight. The trip to the rescue of the steamers at Cape Chat was cancelled, the tug Blenheim going from Souris to the relief of the icebound steamers. The Stanley left Pictou at 4.20 p. m. yesterday with 100 passengers. Three days mail, two cars express and two cars baggage for Georgetown, and will return at once to Pictou to load cargo for the Magdalen Islands.

It will be remembered that Lieut. Peake was gassed sometime ago and his leave of absence is granted to give him an opportunity for complete restoration to health. His arrival at Halifax was a pleasant surprise to his sister and relatives as they had had no previous intimation of his coming. Lieut. Peake is attached to the 8th Siege under his brother Lieut. Col. A. G. Peake and will receive a warm welcome home from his many friends in Charlottetown.

A FORTUNATE ESCAPE.—Among the passengers crossing by the Carriery, Wednesday morning was Martin Melrae, city, from the School for the Blind, Halifax. Needless to say his parents were happily surprised when he walked in, as they had no word from him since the explosion although they wrote several letters. After receiving the first letter he wired that he was well and coming home, but the message was not received. After buying his ticket he became ill and was unable to come for some time. He thinks himself fortunate as he escaped in the explosion with but a slight scratch. The
