**PORK MARKET.**—The price paid for pork on the market yesterday was the same as last, but The Guardian is advised that prices will be reduced one-half cent next week.

**CHURCH OF ENGLAND.**—There will be Divine Service at St. Johns, Milton, at 11 a. m., at St. Marks, Rustico at 3 p. m., at St. Johns, Milton at 7 p. m. on Sunday 14th.

**COMING VISITOR.**—Dr. H. T. DeWolfe, President of the Maritime Baptist Convention, and Principal of Acadia Ladies Seminary, will arrive in Charlottetown to-night. Dr. DeWolfe is one of the foremost preachers in the Maritime Provinces. He will occupy the pulpit at the morning and evening services of the Baptist Church to-morrow.

**DAMP NUISANCE.**—Some six days of drizzle and drizzle have left the streets and roads in the usual quagmire condition. A few shovelfuls of gravel made their belated appearance yesterday on some of the crossings but in most cases Nature will be allowed to do the job. Water Street is particularly stood in need of attention. Meantime shoe-shining parlours flourish and everybody is happy 'twas ever thus.

**BICYCLE CONTEST.**—The National Clothing Company's bicycle contest is becoming very popular among the boys. The Guardian reporter has been informed that Master Gerald Maddigan, son of Mr. R. F. Maddigan, has already handed in 2,000 votes, which is a very creditable beginning. All the other contestants are requested to hand in their votes as often as possible, as interest is daily growing in this contest.

**BLUE LOOKOUT FOR BOARDERS.**—Advice from Boston state the price of beans has soared from \$3.75 to \$5 a bushel. The beans that the Quaker city famous are imported either from California or Michigan. A bean famine is imminent. Already the restaurants have cut the fare in half, and places where an ample helping was thrown in with the beans or fish cakes, have eliminated them altogether or are charging extra for a spoonful or two. So this old staple is likely to appear in more meagre dimensions on the tables of Canadian boarding houses in the days to come.

**ALL MARITIME MEN.**—It is interesting to note that at the induction service of Rev. A. D. McIntosh of Sabley, Acadia, recently, the ministers taking part in the service were nearly all Maritime Men. Mr. McIntosh himself is a former minister of the Provinces, having held charges in Pugwash, Gore, Kennebec, and Little Harbor, N. S., and Souris, P. E. I. Rev. H. W. Forbes, who was moderator of the Presbytery, formerly held parishes in Upper Stewiacke, N. S., and George town, P. E. I., while Rev. William McNichol, of Claresholm, who preached the sermon, was at one time minister in Hopewell, N. S., and is well known in New Brunswick.

**SERIOUS FIRE.**—Much sympathy is felt for the family of Tobias Landrigan of Sturgeon in the loss of their house which was destroyed by fire on Wednesday, Oct. 27th. The fire started from a boiling tin in an outside building attached to the house, and before help could be obtained it had made such headway that it was impossible to save the house. The roof of the barn, which was newly tarred, also caught fire, and in the efforts to extinguish it, the house had to be abandoned and very little of the furniture and clothing could be saved. Unfortunately there was no insurance. The loss is upwards of two thousand dollars including about six hundred bushels of potatoes, eighty bushels of wheat which was kept in a granary over the building where the fire started, also all the furniture of the dining-room, kitchen and bedrooms. This is the third disastrous fire which has occurred in the community lately, and is all the worse coming at the very beginning of winter, when the work of building is so difficult. —Comm.

**WILL PROBATED.**—The will of the late Mr. Phelan has been admitted to probate. It is dated December 14th, 1914. The executors are James Edon, Thomas Curran and J. A. Kelly. The estate consists of personal property amounting to \$20,213.28. It includes city debentures, \$7,000, one debenture of the Eastern Car Company, \$500, proceeds of two water-works debentures, \$1,000, dividends and debentures, \$175, cash in Dominion Savings Bank, \$1,787.30, cash in Royal Bank, \$9,645.98, personal effects, \$105. The deceased bequeaths this amount to the Roman Catholic Episcopal Corporation upon trust, to invest the same and pay the yearly interest to the Charlottetown Conference of St. Vincent de Paul's Society for the benefit of the poor. The trustees in the same manner as the society has been accustomed to distribute. In the event of the society ceasing to exist or ceasing to distribute money for the purpose, the remainder is to be invested and the interest distributed among the poor of Charlottetown at the discretion of the above Corporation.

**Another German Cruiser Was Torpedoed**

**COPENHAGEN, via London, Nov. 11.**—A Stockholm despatch to the "Daily News" gives the report that the German protected cruiser Frauenlieb, a sister ship of the Undine, has been torpedoed off the south coast of Sweden.

The Undine was sunk off the coast of Sweden several days ago. Both the Undine and Frauenlieb were protected cruisers, with a displacement of 2,672 tons and a complement of 275 men.

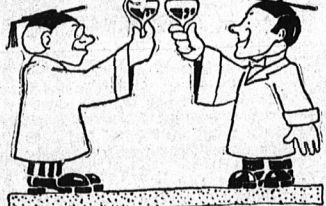

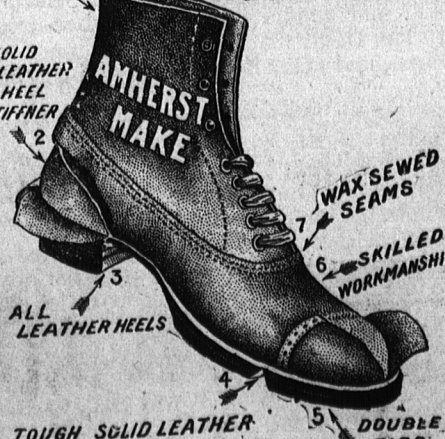

## BRITAIN IS KEEPING HER PROMISE TO GIVE ALL ASSISTANCE POSSIBLE TO SERBIA

LONDON, Nov. 9.—Many questions concerning the war were pondered in the House of Commons today, but little in the way of new information was brought forth from the Government. The Foreign Secretary, Sir Edward Grey, made a long statement on the subject of political conditions in the Balkans and the assistance promised to Serbia by Great Britain.

Serbia all assistance in her power. His use of the words "without qualification or reserve." In his statement before the House of Commons on September 28, when promising to assist Serbia, meant that concessions previously suggested to Bulgaria, were at an end and that British troops would be used solely to help the friends of these nations and to fight for their and her interests.

The sympathies of King Ferdinand of Bulgaria, for Germany and Austria, the Foreign Secretary said, always have been known, and the Government was aware as early as April that the negotiations were in progress between Bulgaria and Turkey under German influence. As to why no military assistance for Serbia had been available at the time of opening of the campaign, Sir Edward declared he was neither willing nor competent to state Secretary Grey made to clear the movements of troops to Saloniki and from that point have been dependent on the consent of Greece. Serbia was notified on September 24th of the despatch of British troops to her assistance.
