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New York Giants Fined

CINCINNATI, Jan. 12 — (AP) — Baseball Commissioner A. B. Chandler hung fines on Leo Durocher, Freddie Fitzsimmons and the New York National League baseball club today for violating the tampering rule. He warned that more severe penalties will be inflicted if anyone does it again.

Durocher, manager of the Giants, and Fitzsimmons, last year's Boston Braves' coach, were fined \$500 each for negotiating a 1949 contract while Freddie still was employed by the Beantown Club. Fitzsimmons also was suspended from March 1 to April 1.

The New York club was fined \$2,000.

The rules say a player or coach must have the written consent of his club before he may negotiate with another outfit.

Chandler said that "Except for the fact that Frederick Fitzsimmons has had long and honorable service in baseball, the Commissioner would deprive the New York club of his services for the 1949 season."

Baseball's head man said he wants the Giants' management to certify that the fines of Durocher and Fitzsimmons are paid solely out of their own funds and that they are not reimbursed "now or hereafter."

The Neil award, presented by Nat Fleischer, president of the

Boxing Writers Association of New York at its 10th annual dinner, was named in memory of the former Associated Press war correspondent and boxing writer who was killed in Spain during the Spanish Civil War.

Williams, who plans to go after the welterweight crown if he gets past Emrino Bonanos in California later this winter, defended his title three times last year. In 11 winning fights he knocked out Jesse Flores and Beau Jack and outpointed B. Jago with championship on the line.
