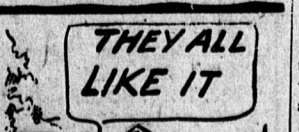

Report of the Grand Worthy Patriarch for Quarter Ending March 31, 1930.

As people of intelligence, we have learned ere this, that no task is accomplished without considerable effort on the part of those in charge, and the Cause of Temperance is by no means an exception. Therefore, let us not simply lay down on the job, but get busy on the work before us.
As we read the accounts in other countries, we should take fresh courage, for Canada, this fair Canada of ours, is the only country that has taken a backward step in its liquor legislation. It is high time that the people became awake to the situation. Surely the past, with the open bar on all sides, and its resultant evils is not a feature of our modern day, that would require its revival, but we have got to be alive to this possibility in some shape or form. What then must we do? What has to be faced? I think through every Sunday School in the Province, we should endeavor to hold a Temperance Sunday once a quarter, and to stress the evils of Intemperance.
While this is done in some fashion now, probably in some schools, and not in others, the matter is not emphasized in any degree or to any extent. Furthermore, through the Y. P. S. of all Churches, we should, if possible hold Temperance Evening as frequently as they will allow us, and to endeavor to have our Y. P. S. programme, at least quarterly dwell upon the Liquor Question. It is only thus that the dreadful evils of Intemperance are going to be made manifest.
In conclusion, I may state that now the summer and good roads are here once more, let us all get in earnest once again and get behind this great question. We have an influence to exert and let us use that to the very best advantage. Before our next Quarterly Session, we will hope to have some progress to report.

KEEPING THE FEED AND WATER CLEAN ON THE RANGE
(Experimental Farms Note)
With the ever increasing danger of parasitic infection due to the intensive methods now in vogue in the rearing of chicks and the handling of the laying and breeding stock it behooves breeders to adopt every sanitary precaution to ensure the health and well being of the growing chicks.
Infection through the drinking water and feed, while on range, should be avoided by using stands for the feed troughs and drinking vessels, so that there will be no change of in-

fection through the consumption of feed that has become contaminated by coming in contact with the droppings on the ground or through the drinking of water that has formed puddles on the ground around the drinking pails.
For this reason all feed and water consumed should be supplied either from hoppers for the dry mash or from troughs for the scratch grain and from elevated clean vessels for the drinking water. The roosting shelters, hoppers, troughs and water stands should be moved at frequent intervals so as to keep the chicks on fresh ground as much as possible.
For sketches of shelters, hoppers, or water stands write the Poultry Division, Central Experimental Farm.

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The Markets

MONTREAL, Que., May 7—Manitoba number six wheat on the Montreal cash grain market was marked down 2 cents per bushel to 83 cents today. Rolled oats were reduced 10 cents to 335 and winter wheat flour in car lots was cut to 5.25 to 5.35 as compared with 5.30 to 5.35 yesterday. Dullness continued to characterize the dairy and produce markets here today. Butter was reduced, while other lines held unchanged. Little business is being done in butter and New Zealand was quoted at 31½ to 32 cents per pound. Prices to the retail trade were unchanged. Receipts were 232 boxes. The cheese market was quiet and unchanged. Receipts were 1,532 boxes. There was a firm tone to the egg market with prices unchanged. Arrivals were 3,961 cases. Potatoes were unchanged.
OTTAWA, Ont., May 7—Canadian Egg markets continue firm today. There is a brisk demand for storing and all supplies are well cleaned up at firm prices. Toronto. This egg market is steady and unchanged today. Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs extras, 26 to 29 cents, 26 to 27 cents, seconds 24 to 25, delivered, cases returned. Sales of carlots from the prairies are reported at extras 32½, firsts 30½, delivered. Ontario storage packed eggs are selling at extras 33½, firsts 31½, delivered. Montreal. Egg receipts here yesterday were 3,951 cases as compared to 2,652 cases on the corresponding day last year. Dealers are quoting country shippers for local ungraded eggs, extras 29 to 32 cents, firsts 26 to 29 cents, seconds 25 to 27 cents, delivered. A brisk demand for storing is keeping all receipts well cleared; consumption is also good.
