**S' Side Benefits By Federal Appropriation**

On Friday morning Hon. J. P. McInyre, Minister of Public Works Mr. L. B. McMillan, Deputy Minister, Mr. Messervy, City engineer and Mr. W. H. McDougall, Engineer for Prince County, met the Mayor and some of the Town Council in Summerside arranged for the commencement of the new concrete road to be built at the eastern approach to the town. This is the outcome of the conference last Wednesday in Charlottetown between Premier Lea and other members of the Government and representatives of the Summerside Town Council with regard to a portion of the Federal grant for unemployment being given to Summerside. This work is for the relief of the unemployed in Summerside and surrounding district. The Town mixer and other equipment belonging to the town will be used. Mr. Millman, street foreman, will have charge of the work. The roadway is to be a permanent one of cement, the same as has been put down on Water Street and Central Street, and will commence from the bridge at the eastern boundary, going east for one mile. This road is one of the most travelled on the Island. During a test made last summer 800 cars passed over that piece of road in ten hours. The new road will be a boon to travellers going to and from Borden besides being a great asset to the town of Summerside. The work of surveying was commenced on Friday afternoon.

**HOSPITAL CAMPAIGN SPEEDED UP**

Charlottetown Teams "Throw Down The Bars."

"The Provincial District Committees are not affected by the fact that the Charlottetown teams have thrown down the bars," said Executive Chairman W. F. Tidmarsh, in the Prince Edward Island Hospital campaign headquarters last Sunday evening. "All subscriptions obtained in Queens and Kings Counties outside of Charlottetown still will be credited to the districts in which they are given. Charlottetown workers, I hope, will assist the District Committees in getting pledges, but they will not take any contributions away from the Provincial District Committees. I have not forgotten that every District Committee has a quota to meet, therefore all gifts from persons throughout the Province will be credited against these quotas. We wish to encourage our good Provincial neighbors in every way possible. They are loyal Prince Edward Islanders, and I am confident they will raise the entire \$80,000 which is looked for from the Provincial Committees. We are all staunch comrades in a noble cause."

At the eighth rally supper of the Charlottetown committees and divisions Friday night, all the twenty teams voted to "throw down the bars." This means that, so far as Charlottetown and Royalty are concerned, any volunteer worker may approach any prospect, without having the white index card bearing the possible subscriber's name. It is assumed that by this stage of the campaign all the team members have had opportunity to visit the prospects whose cards they hold. Throwing down the bars is the usual campaign procedure for the last few days.

With only three meetings left at which reports are to be made, the ninth rally supper this Monday evening, the tenth rally supper tomorrow, Tuesday evening and the Victory Supper Wednesday evening, excitement among the campaign workers is at fever heat. Committeemen and team members are scouring the city for subscriptions. Many of them plan to approach some of the earlier givers who perhaps made smaller contributions than they would have made if left until the last.

Experience shows that many of the earlier subscribers often give perfunctorily, without weighing their proportionate shares in the community's undertaking. It frequently happens that such contributors welcome a chance to increase their liberality to their hospital. The total of increases alone often reaches a goodly sum.

Veteran campaigners also are well aware that subscribers whose original gifts are below the minimum required for memorials often increase their contributions to memorial grade. When the public realizes what a high privilege it is to name some part of the new hospital in honor of a living or departed relative or friend, contributors sometimes even seek the workers and force additional subscriptions upon them. The bronze tablets perpetuating honored names in the new Prince Edward Island Hospital will be exceptionally beautiful, and will remain in sight of all visitors as lasting memorials to beloved persons long after the memorial givers have passed away.

In all up-to-date hospital campaigns, the memorial plan is a major feature and a prime factor in the raising of substantial funds. A few of the artistic memorial books adorned with half-tone reproductions of photographs showing the Prince Edward Island Hospital's activities and containing a graded list of memorial opportunities remain in campaign headquarters, and will be sent on request without charge. Mr. W. K. Rogers, Chairman of the Memorial Committee, has characterized the memorial book as the most valuable printed matter in this campaign.

Mr. Wallace L. Higgins, Chairman of the Business Friends Committee and Vice-Chairman of the Allied Towns Committee, hurried into campaign headquarters, 136 Richmond street, Saturday afternoon with a telegram from Mr. T. H. Howard, of Moncton, financial director of the T. Eaton Company Maritime Ltd., informing him that the Eaton Company gladly contributes \$2,000 to the hospital fund. Chairman Higgins accredited Mr. Hiram Atkinson, manager of the Eaton Grocers, with having given him such assistance in obtaining the generous Eaton subscription. A joint meeting of the Executive Committee and the Memorial Committee was in progress when Mr. Higgins dashed in, and when he had read Mr. Howard's telegram, they responded with hearty applause.

Mr. Leslie Stacey, general manager of the F. W. Woolworth Co. store on Queen street, received on Saturday from the head office of the Woolworth Co. Ltd., in Toronto, a letter in which his principals said:

"We are delighted to join with the other merchants and people of the Province in making a contribution to the new Prince Edward Island Hospital."

Chairman Higgins spent all day Saturday afternoon and evening in campaign headquarters and the Canadian National Telegraphs office sending letters and wires to business friends of Charlottetown concerns all over North America. He has communicated with hundreds of corporations and copartnerships outside the Province who have substantial interest in the welfare of the Island, and already has received many gratifying replies, although his committee was the last to be appointed by the Executive Committee. Chairman Higgins is running a race with Dr. J. A. Clark, Chairman of the Committee on Former Residents, who also is in daily receipt of contributions to the cause. The friendly rivalry between these energetic leaders is inspiring all the other units.

The headquarters force on Saturday completed the grand total of the various units in the campaign organization up to and including the eighth rally supper, held Friday evening. It was found that the twenty Charlottetown teams in the two divisions commanded by Mrs. H. Hooper Horne and Mr. Charles H. Black had raised a grand total of \$64,228. Mr. H. Hooper Horne, Chairman of the 'Allied Towns Committee, had turned in \$8,571 from nineteen of the forty-seven Provincial District Committees heading up in his unit. The grand totals of those nineteen districts were published in Saturday's Guardian, with the exception of \$437 from Montague, reported several days ago, but omitted from the recapitulation through a regretted oversight in campaign headquarters.

Chairman Clark, with a grand total of \$1,410 from Former Residents, and Chairman Higgins, with \$1,820 up to Friday night from Business Friends, were in close competition. Since then, Chairman Higgins has received the \$2,000 Eaton contribution, and he has other good subscriptions on the way.

The team with the largest grand total for the first eight rallies is the Nurses' Team, No. 19, captained by Mrs. W. E. Bentley, with \$6,985 in 119 subscriptions. Next comes Captain E. H. Beer's team, No. 4, with 63 contributors totaling \$5,544. Captain Walter S. Grant's team, No. 2, known as "the Old Reliablies," ranks third with \$5,466 in 75 subscriptions. This is the outcome of the conference last Wednesday in Charlottetown between Premier Lea and other members of the Government and representatives of the Summerside Town Council with regard to a portion of the Federal grant for unemployment being given to Summerside. This work is for the relief of the unemployed in Summerside and surrounding district. The Town mixer and other equipment belonging to the town will be used. Mr. Millman, street foreman, will have charge of the work. The roadway is to be a permanent one of cement, the same as has been put down on Water Street and Central Street, and will commence from the bridge at the eastern boundary, going east for one mile. This road is one of the most travelled on the Island. During a test made last summer 800 cars passed over that piece of road in ten hours. The new road will be a boon to travellers going to and from Borden besides being a great asset to the town of Summerside. The work of surveying was commenced on Friday afternoon.
