ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

Reporters and Correspondents Everywhere.

Some days ago the Guardian made enquiries as to the crop prospects in this province and received the following excellent summary:

Oats have grown well all along except on the low lands that have suffered from too much rain.

Potatoes that were planted very early have missed in some cases, but the great bulk of the crop has come up well. The root crop is promising. The abundant moisture stored in the land will ensure luxuriant growth during the next month. The hay and grain harvest will be later than last year.

There is perhaps a larger average of oats than last year the high prices for the crop of 1901 is the cause. Other crops will be about the same.

Fodder corn is not doing well on account of cold and too much rain.

Fruit prospects are the best in the history of the Province. The apple trees are literally loaded with fruit. Thinning ought not to be neglected at the proper time, so as to insure good, large, well matured apples, and to keep the trees from overbearing. Spraying with Paris green and bordeaux mixture is being attended to much more generally than formerly. This will likely insure sound, clean fruit.

Pastures are not so good as last year at this time as the white clover has been pretty much killed out in the winter.

The crop prospect for 1902 is on the whole favorable at this time of year. Hay will be undoubtedly a short crop, perhaps not half of last year's yield. This is largely on account of the clover being all winter killed.

The season was very favorable for getting in grains, roots and tubers and the land was well cultivated which taken with the abundant supply of moisture we have had will insure good crops of straw.

Wheat seems somewhat backward on account of the cold weather, but is thick enough on the ground and with warm weather in July has a good chance to turn off a good crop.
