Benning On Trial On Spy Charge

OTTAWA, Oct. 23 — (CP) — Louis Gouzenko testified today that he had seen the agent "Foster" identified as "Scot Benning" in a Russian Embassy file. Appearing again as a star Crown witness, he gave that evidence in the Ontario Supreme Court jury trial of James Scotland Benning, 33-year-old, Montreal-born former official of the Munitions Department, charged with communicating confidential information to Russia. Gouzenko, former cipher clerk for the Embassy's military attaché, said, however, that the file was not among the documents he took with him when he left there for the last time Feb. 5, 1946.

Chief Justice J. C. McRury warned the jury of 12 men that Gouzenko's evidence as to Foster's identity must be corroborated by other testimony since he was once a co-conspirator in the Russian espionage, see page 10.

Applications Mount For Savings Bonds

OTTAWA, Oct. 23 — (CP) — Total individual applications for purchase of Canada Savings Bonds are nudging the 200,000 mark, with the average purchase at \$761.27, compared with \$562.05 at the same stage of the Ninth Victory Loan, National Headquarters reported to-night. Average purchase through the payroll savings plan is \$177, compared with \$188.14 in the last victory loan.

Total national cumulative sales of savings bonds stands at \$64,669,500 after five days of selling, but there is no official objective for the campaign, which opened a week ago yesterday. Personnel of the Royal Canadian Navy so far have purchased \$389,200 in bonds. The East Coast Command bought \$141,800, the West Coast Command \$134,650, and Naval Headquarters \$112,750.

Calls Parley In Air Wage Dispute
WASHINGTON, Oct. 22 — (AP) — Chairman Frank Douglas of the National Mediation Board called today for a conference of both sides tomorrow in the stalemated wage dispute between 1,400 striking pilots and Trans World Airline.
Stepping into the three-day walkout that has tied up the line's 28,000-mile system, Mr. Douglas said he had telephoned president Jack Frye of T.W.A. and David I. Behneke, president of the Airline Pilots Association (A.P.L.), to meet him and discuss their differences.
There was no immediate word whether the men would accept.
