ELECTRICALLY GROWN GRAIN

(By Dominion News Service.) LONDON, August 28.—Promising results of the application of electricity to agriculture are being realized in the experiments which are being conducted by the Ministry of Agriculture at Rothamstead. The Ministry's Electro-Culture Committee state that their investigations "may be fraught with the most important consequences to agriculture, as the results hitherto attained clearly indicate." "By a series of field experiments spread over a number of years," says the Journal of the Ministry of Agriculture, "the Committee have shown the type of electrical apparatus most suitable for the production of the high-tension discharge, and have also shown that an increase of 20 per cent. can be obtained with certain cereal crops." The Committee propose to devote the greater part of their energies in 1924 to pot-culture and small plot experiments, and to laboratory investigations, because they consider this will throw much light on the proper conditions of electrical discharge in the field. Last year remarkable results were obtained in pot-culture experiments with grain, an increase of 18 per cent. being obtained with only a single month's electrification. These large increases in grain yield were usually associated with very small increases in total yield. In 1925 field experiments will be resumed with the knowledge gained. "The committee," it is added, "expect by the end of 1925 to have made very definite progress in knowledge of electro-culture, and a definite advance towards its practical application." Electro-culture the name by which the process of applying electrical current to growing crops is known, has fascinated the minds of many scientists for some years. It has equally repelled them by reason of knowledge and data of the conditions governing growth and the mechanism required for applying it in every-day farming. Isolated experiments by individuals were carried out in Britain, several Continental countries and in the United States before attention was focussed on electro-culture as a possible field of research. Since the war, with the help of the Development Commissioners, experiments have been carried out in a series of districts including Rothamstead, Wisley, Hereford and Dumfries. Various methods of applying the current were formerly used, but the one now apparently favored is similar to, or a development of, that introduced into this country 20 years ago by Professor Lenstrom, of Helsingfors. It consists of an overhead discharge of current from wires stretched over the crops and suspended on poles. The area of experimentation at Rothamstead is five acres, and the installation is described as an economic one, with poles spaced widely and the wires high to avoid interference with farming operations. There are nine cross-roads poles,
