booths; Mr. W. H. Matheson, in charge of the ice-cream booth; and Mr. J. R. Barr, in charge of the drive stands on the midway. These stands were in charge of Messrs. A. Sharp, Wm. Strong, L. M. McCann, G. A. Moore, Wm. S. Austin, A. McFarlane, Harry Ford, W. Sudbury and others.

The monument which is the largest and most imposing soldiers' monument in the province, stands 14 feet, 6 inches in height from the ground to the top of the bronze statue of the soldier, 7 feet 6 inches in height. The soldier is shown in the act of advancing in battle order, with his bayoneted rifle at the trail. The sculptor has produced a very life like figure, the face all aglow with the ardor of battle, and every detail of the uniform and equipment is absolutely accurate. The grey granite pedestal is 3 feet high with the base 3 feet 6 inches square. All around the top of four sides the pedestal are carved maple leaves. On the front, or south side are the names Yyres, Somme, Prince County Memorial 1914-1918 and the following verse:

O Canada the blood of all thy sons,
Cries out today, from far and glorious deeds,
And spirit legions of the immortal ones
Who died to serve their country
and its needs,
Pledge thee, anew, by their white honour roll,
To loftier issues, born of sacrifice,
Bidding thee keep unstained that nobler soul,
Which they have ransomed with so great a price.

On the east side underneath the words Festubert, Courcellette and Vimy Ridge are the names of the men who died of wounds.

On the west side underneath the words Festubert, Courcellette and Arras are the names of the men killed in action.

On the north side are the words, Cambrai, Mons.

On the east and west sides extending from the base are anchor rings with laurel wreaths.

The financing of the monument was made possible by 110 guarantors, a general executive committee was appointed consisting of Mayor Campbell as Chairman and Mr. LeRoy Holman, Secretary. There were also a number of sub-committees, money was raised by entertainments, and letters sent over the continent to former residents of Prince County who contributed \$2,000.

The total cost of the monument is \$8,000.
