Brig. Stewart To Command Military District No. 6

HALEFAX, Aug. 29—National Defence Headquarters today announced a change in command at Halifax, headquarters of Military District No. 6. Brig. D. A. White, C.B.E., D.S.O., of Ottawa, is retiring to civil life after commanding there since early in 1948. He is being succeeded by Brig. James Crossley Stewart, C.B.E., D.S.O., of Victoria, B.C., who has just returned from service overseas since 1939.

"District Officer Commanding M. D. No. 6, Halifax" has meant for Brig. White a ceaseless supervision of the embarkation point for hundreds of thousands of young Canadians going to war. Lately he has been on hand to welcome to their homeland scores of thousands of repatriated troops, and to speed them on their journey westward to homes all across Canada. He has had heavy responsibilities in supervising large training establishments and while the war was at its height, of many coastal defence establishments. His staff had the maintenance and supply of Canadian troops in Newfoundland and other coastal areas named by Canadians as part of its responsibility. Brig. White also had responsibilities in regard to joint defence requirements with the United States relating to Atlantic defence projects.

Brig. White has won the respect and admiration of the people of Halifax and the Maritimes generally for his unflinching tact, and similarly enjoyed at all times the loyal support of all ranks serving under him, and of all the Armed Forces of Canada with whom he had to deal in the conduct of the war effort in Military District No. 6.

Previously he had been in command of the Canadian Army Trades Training Centre in Hamilton, Ont., taking over there at its inception in 1941. He supervised the rapidly increasing flow through the Trades School which finally reached a capacity of more than 150 qualified Army tradesmen each week.

LYOYD NOLAN IN REVERSE ROLE
