**American Hockey League May Open On November 8th**

BOSTON, Oct. 22.—Plans for opening the schedule of the new Canadian-American Hockey league with a game on the Boston Thanksgiving night were considered today at the organization meeting of the league here. The meeting decided that the playing schedule would be completed and announced by November 1. Representatives of the Boston, Springfield, Providence, New Haven and Quebec Clubs attended, and it was announced that Brooklyn would probably enter the league later.

Each club submitted a list of available referees and it was decided that Charles C. Clapp of Boston, who was elected President of the league, should name all officials of the league. Final lists of the players must be in the hands of the President by November 3.

The New Haven club will play its home games on outside rinks until its arena is completed about the January 1. A working agreement between the new body and the National Hockey League was approved.

**Science Proves Life After Death, Lodge States**

LONDON, Oct. 22.—Survival after death is now an established fact as the result of scientific study, Sir Oliver Lodge, noted British spiritualist, declared in the course of a lecture here tonight.

Declaring that it is absurd for anyone to contend that prayer cannot be answered by a higher being, Lodge said that he has absolutely no apology to make for anything that he must either apologize for or defend vigorously," stated Dr. T. T. Shields, pastor of Jarvis Street Baptist Church, here last night in answer to the resolution of Ontario and Quebec yesterday that he must either apologize for his attack on McMaster College for alleged modernist teachings, or resign from its board of governors. Dr. Shields' statement was made at a mass meeting held in his church.

"I issue a challenge to McMaster University, let any human opponent prevent me preaching this gospel. I believe we have here the nucleus of a body that in these degenerate days, it may please God to set up as a standard."

Dr. Shields stated that steps would immediately be taken to establish another college apart from McMaster to teach the Baptist doctrine.

B., Oct. 22.—That at least one life was lost in the storm which swept Northumberland Strait Wednesday night, was the report that reached Moncton Wednesday night from Buctouche, Kent County. Agipye LeBlanc, assistant fishery inspector, while searching Buctouche Bay for possible illegal lobster fishermen, is among the missing, and there is every reason to believe that he was a victim to a tragic drowning while in the performance of his duty.
