Legislature Asks For New Car Ferry Steamer For 1943 Fall Traffic

In the Legislature yesterday the following resolution moved by Hon. Horace Wright and seconded by Hon. Dr. W.J.P. MacMillan, was forwarded to the Governor-in-Council at Ottawa, was adopted unanimously:

"Whereas the citizens of Prince Edward Island through their several organizations have requested the Legislative Assembly in session assembled to insist that the Dominion Government build a new car ferry at once to replace the S.S. 'Charlottetown'."

"And whereas all the members of the Legislative Assembly fully realize the dire situation in which the Province finds itself as regards transportation facilities with the Mainland."

"And whereas the Dominion Government is emphasizing the increased production of food products for 1943."

"And whereas almost the entire export of the Province is food products essential for war requirements and the total outward movement for the year 1943 amounted to about 17,500 railway freight cars."

"And whereas the very existence of the Province depends upon continuous transportation facilities because almost all the essential fuel, fertilizers and large quantities of mill feeds and concentrates for the production of butter and other meat products must be imported."

"And whereas the essential requirements of the various services in this Province greatly increase the tax on transportation facilities and greatly increase the carrying capacity of the car ferry for other purposes."

"And whereas the present car ferry is being worked to the utmost limit of its capacity and has provided inadequate facilities for the present freight situation because the S.S. 'Prince Edward Island' has only two thirds of the freight carrying capacity of the S.S. 'Charlottetown'."

"And whereas the volume of traffic is increasing enormously and in addition much of the freight formerly moved by steamer must now be ferried."

"And whereas in the opinion of the Legislature it is totally unsafe to rely upon the S.S. 'Prince Edward Island' for about thirty years old and which has already met with two serious accidents this winter, to maintain the essential services already set forth."

"Therefore resolved that the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Prince Edward Island petition the Government of Canada to take steps to build a new car ferry, as a measure to be ready for the 1943 fall traffic."

The resolution was discussed in committee of the whole House, with Mr. Wilson in the chair, and minor amendments were made before it passed in the form above given.

SHORTAGE OF LIME

Sir, I feel sure that you and your readers are vitally interested in the welfare of the farmers of the Province and at all times anxious to know what their prospects are.

I wish to inform you that the Department of Agriculture finds it nearly impossible to secure lime this season for the reason that both the Snowflake and Brookville Lime Companies report that, on account of shortage of labour, they will be unable to complete orders on hand before the first of June.

I have taken the matter up with the Minister of Labour with the hope that he may be able to place in political debtors the necessary quarries so that farmers may be able to secure their requirements at an early date.
