ANNUAL MEETING ZION CHURCH.—The annual meeting of Zion Presbyterian Church was held on Thursday evening 15th inst. Every report submitted denoted progress. The session reported 43 added to the church, 27 by profession and 16 by certificate. 16 new families added to the congregation, 8 to the recruits for the Ministry making a total of 19 now enrolled. A large number of Worshipping Children was inaugurated some time ago and as a result there has been an average attendance of 56 at the Church Services each Sunday. The Pastor has been greatly encouraged during the year by the large and steadily increasing attendance at the regular diets of worship. The Sunday School report also indicated substantial progress: the attendance increasing a little 22 per cent, and the collections by nearly 39 per cent. 12 of those attending the Sunday School, united with the church during the year. In connection with the Sunday School the pastor has started a class for the study of the books of the Bible and from present indications the attendance will soon be all that could be desired. The statements submitted by the other financial side also indicated that progress has been made. About \$7,000 passed into the coffers of the congregation during the year. This amount included the sum received for the sale of the old gables. The Ladies Aid contributed upwards of \$1,100.00. The Missionary Society over \$1,000.00. Substantial increases were made in the collection both envelope and loose, the latter doubling during the year. The outlook for the congregation is very promising.

ABNEY.—The semi-annual examination of Abney school was held on December 23rd. There were thirty pupils present on that day, also a number of ratepayers and visitors including school officers. The pupils were carefully examined in most of the province ones, and were very ready and unhesitatingly answered all questions asked, thus proving themselves worthy of praise for the attention given to their work during the past term. It is worthy of mention that the above named school is one of the up-to-date ones in this province, and contains all modern and up-to-date furniture, the walls are beautifully painted, a sky blue color, and upon them may be seen many handsome pictures thus making the school room a very attractive one.—L.

SHORT COURSE.—The ladies of the Short Course listened to one of the most interesting and certainly one of the most useful lectures of the series that by Mr. Duncan Anderson of Ottawa, on "The Home," on Wednesday last. Beginning with construction, very concise and clear information was given on the site, best materials for building; windows, doors, everything necessary to secure most complete and efficient ventilation; the most convenient sites for different rooms, etc.; stair cases; kitchen sink; hot and cold water system; bathroom and sewage; water supply on the farm for the houses as well as the barns. Dealing with the houses already erected Mr. Anderson gave very valuable information as to the best way of making the very few alterations necessary to bring them into a condition for the adoption of the water and sewerage system which he advocated. The most significant fact brought out was that after consultation with local tradesmen, Mr. Anderson was able to state that a complete hot and cold water system, bathroom and closet could be installed for \$350. In view of such facts, surely the time has come when every up-to-date farmer can find the way to provide the women of his household with these indispensable necessities. It is expected that Mr. Anderson will repeat his interesting lecture to the second of the Short Courses which begins work next week.
