"I see that The Guardian speaks this morning of an ice famine," said a well-known citizen yesterday afternoon. "It is nothing to what we had fifteen years ago. In that year the Northumberland ran regularly till the 22nd of January and the Erie kept at work in the harbor more or less all winter. She actually made some trips in every month of the cold season, stopping for a time about the 8th of February and beginning again in March."

The remains of Rev. Frank Demit Davidson, a widely known Baptist minister who recently died at Lower Montague were interred at St. Mary's, opposite Fredericton on the 30th Dec. ult. Deceased, who with his parents, had been a member of the Amherst Baptist Church had been greatly beloved as pastor of the churches at Hopewell, N. B., River John St. Mary's and Montague. He was a victim of consumption. He leaves a widow formerly Miss Sabra Atkinson, of Southampton N. B. and seven surviving children.

THE death a few months ago in Eureka, California, of James A. McLean, son of Charles McLean, of Bedouque, in this Province, brought to an early and premature close a career full of exceptional promise. The deceased was only in his thirty-fifth year, and had given many evidences of a superior mechanical ability, which promised to elevate him to the highest position in the profession he had chosen. He was a nephew of Archibald Ferguson, of Springfield, with whom he had resided from a child until he was seventeen years old. At that time he left for Boston where he took up the trade of a machinist. At the World's Fair in Chicago, in 1892, Mr. McLean, only twenty-one years of age, exhibited an engine that he had designed and constructed himself, and for which he received a medal. After serving some years in Boston, he removed to California, where he continued his studies to perfect himself in his work. He happened to be in San Francisco at the time of the earthquake on April 18th, and was one of the victims of that disaster, losing all his possessions, including tools, models, and books. Previous to that he had been working on an internal combustion engine which was completed on April 2nd, 1901. Since the patent was issued he had developed many improvements in this engine, which in the opinion of machine experts was destined to be as far in advance over Watt's engine, as the latter was ahead of anything designed before his time. Unfortunately, all of Mr. McLean's improvements, embodied in the models were destroyed during the fire, and earthquake, and it is doubtful if anything further can be done to make use of his labors. Had he succeeded in completing his work, there is no doubt but that a revolution in engine building would have been accomplished.
