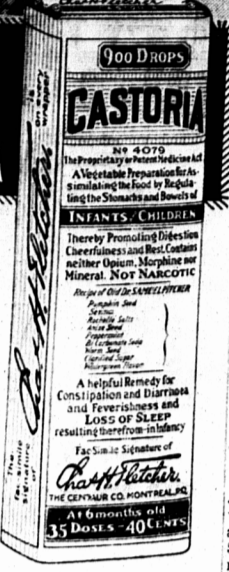

THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, Que., Jan. 7. - Sales of several loads Canadian western barley were made to continental buyers on the Montreal grain market today but the trade is all lines of grain with the United States exporters were also in the market for Manitoba spring wheat and Canadian western barley and sales of some fair sized lots were made at CIF prices Buffalo and bay ports. The domestic load car lots of coarse grains showed some improvement from country buyers and demand from country buyers and the tone of the market was firm. A firm feeling prevailed in the market for spring wheat grades of flour under a limited demand. The trade in winter wheat flour was also inactive but values were unchanged. Prices for all lines of mill-feed were well maintained under a good demand. The market for standard grades of rolled oats was quiet but firm. There was a decided improvement in the foreign demand for Canadian baled hay and prices were steady. A feature of the egg trade was the weakness that developed in the market for strictly fresh grades and prices scored a decline of five cents per dozen. This was attributed to the increased production at Canadian producing centres and the continued liberal offerings from the United States. There was steady demand for storage eggs and prices were firm. The receipts were 161 cases. A fair
