### BRIGANDS IN CHINA ACTIVE.

HONG KONG, Aug. 27—Several hundred Chinese brigands today attacked a running train at Fayuen, on the line from Canton to Hankow. The engineer, in spite of a hail of bullets, refused to put on the brakes. Several of the train men and some passengers were wounded and the cars considerably damaged. When the train reached the market town of Ngwot, it was found impossible to proceed further as the rails had been torn up. The train itself had been completely sacked by the brigands, many of whom are discharged soldiers. They are increasing in numbers and temerity daily. There is much alarm among the village and country populations and troops have been despatched to the scene from Canton.

### MENTAL STRESS AND INSANITY.

LONDON, Aug. 27—Mental stress is declared a striking factor in the growing disease in the number of lunatics. This is indicated in the annual report of the Commissioners on Lunacy.

On Jan. 1 of this year the number of certified insane persons under care in England and Wales was 136,661, the increase in the year being 2,504, contrasted with 2,604 for 1910, 1,766 for 1909, and 2,703 for 1908. The average annual increase for the ten years ending Dec. 31, 1911, was 2,495, and that for the five years ending on the same date, 2,335.

The diminution of the outdoor pauper insane amounting to two per cent., follows a greater reduction in the previous year; and may now, as then, probably be ascribed to advantage being taken of the Old Age Pensions Act by persons living in their own homes, who thus cease to be rate-supported. They would thus pass from the cognizance of the commissioners and increase the number of uncertified insane who are to be found in all classes of the community.

Interesting information is given concerning insanity in relation to sex. The census figures show a mean distribution for the whole of England and Wales of 48 males to 52 females in every 100 persons. The total pauper lunatics in the country had a sex distribution of 47 males to 53 females.

Intemperance in alcohol was considered as a prime factor in the cases as was prolonged mental stress, but here the male cases were more than twice as numerous as the female namely, 78 to 32.

### BIG STRIKE EXPECTED.

VANCOUVER, B. C., August 28—Contractors, who have been carefully investigating the situation, are looking for another big strike of industrial workers of the world to occur just before Christmas. The Great Northern, Canadian Northern, Grand Trunk Pacific and Canadian Pacific all have large numbers of men engaged in constructing in various parts of British Columbia and the plan is to let loose seven or eight thousand of these during the cold months. President Chamberlain, of the Grand Trunk Pacific, was in Vancouver today complaining bitterly of the lack of labor in this province. He said that his company could use 2,000 more men at once and added that if they could not get more there would be a long delay in the completion of the Transcontinental line.

### PROMINENT WOMAN PASSES AWAY.

ST. JOHN, Aug. 29—Mrs. J. McDougall Hall, for many years secretary of the Associated Charities, died today, aged 68c.

LONDON, Aug. 29—Two lives were lost and forty were hurt in a collision of business men's train with another here today.

### TO IROHBIT POLITICAL PATRONAGE.

WELLINGTON, N. Z., Aug. 29—A bill aiming at the destruction of political patronage has been introduced, and provides for a commissioner to control all the chief experiments, except railways.

Applicants seeking the aid of members of Parliament for appointment will be disqualified.

### CUSTOM'S OFFICER IS REINSTATED.

OTTAWA, August 28—The government has re-appointed to his old office as Dominion appraiser, R. W. Bredner, who resigned three years ago to take a more remunerative position as tariff expert for the Canadian Manufacturers' association at Toronto. This appointment is in accordance with Hon. J. D. Reid's policy for improving the efficiency of the customs administration at Ottawa. Mr. Bredner was for twenty-four years in the customs department and is recognized as one of the highest authorities on the tariff and the customs has been endeavoring for some time to have him return to the government service and the necessary arrangements were completed today.

### VENTURESOME YOUTHS TAKE CHANCE.

WINDSOR, Aug. 28—Exhausted from hunger and exposure, and their canoe in imminent danger of being capsized, Anderson McEwen, aged 16, of Windsor, and Hector Koranger, 15, of Detroit, were picked up by the steamer Frank E. Kirby, in Lake Erie of Middle Sister Island.

In an attempt to win a bet that they could paddle to Put-in-Bay, Ohio, the two young men left Belle Isle, without food, and already weak from hunger, they put off for Put-in-Bay.

McEwen claimed they lost their compass and strayed from the course. Loranger became exhausted and lay down in the bottom of the frail craft while his companion tried to keep the canoe headed into the waves, which were running high. When McEwen was almost ready to give up the steamer Kirby was sighted, and fastened a towel to his paddle he signalled for help.

Captain Paul, who was on the bridge, saw the signal of distress and fearing the canoe would tip over, ordered full steam ahead. The waves were so high that when the canoe was in the trough it was completely lost sight of.

Reaching the boat containing the young men the Kirby was listed until the deck was level with the lake, when they were picked up safely.

### REPORT AGAINST OCEAN SEARCHLIGHTS.

LIVERPOOL, Aug. 27—The Advisory Committee on Merchant Shipping to the Board of Trade, which has been considering questions arising out of the Titanic disaster, has reported against the use of searchlights being made compulsory on merchant vessels.

Several experts, notably the Hydrographer of the Navy, whose views on the subject were ascertained, stated that under ordinary circumstances searchlights would be a danger to navigation. The glare would have a blinding effect astern, as well as on the persons in the ship; it was thrown on, rendering it difficult for them to see vessels and lights in the vicinity.

This opinion is in accordance with that of a large number of North Atlantic shipmasters, among whom inquiries were recently made at New York by representatives of the United States government. Nevertheless, some of the transatlantic boats are now experimenting with electric searchlights, the one on board the Hamburg-American liner Kaiserin Augusta Victoria being of \$80,000 candle-power, and equal in size and range to those mounted on German warships.

### BAD MILK USED.

NEW YORK, Aug. 29—In a sensational report the New York Milk Committee says some hotels and swell restaurants are using a quality of milk found in cheap groceries. Some of it has one to ninety million bacteria in each cubic centimetre.

### BANK OF ENGLAND RAISES RATES.

LONDON, Aug. 29—The Bank of England today raised a minimum district rate to four per cent as a protective measure against the influx of bills.

### TOOK LIVE LIZARD FROM WOMAN'S STOMACH.

BOSTON, August 27—A few hours after eating a dish of shrimp salad in a Malden cafe, Mrs. Lillian Tickell was stricken suddenly and mysteriously ill. For three days she was treated by Dr. J. W. Lawrence and Dr. Charles E. Prior, of Malden for ptomain poisoning. Mrs. Tickell was at the point of death.

Then, by an operation that has no equal for novelty, Dr. Prior saved her life. He took a head of lettuce, steamed it, and had Mrs. Tickell inhale the steam. In a short time she choked, gagged and—well, ten minutes later Mrs. Prior and Lawrence were placing a very live lizard in a bottle of alcohol and yesterday Mrs. Tickell was on the road to recovery.

Three hours after she had eaten the salad Mrs. Tickell fell to the floor at her home and writhed in agony. Her condition gave all the signs of ptomain poisoning, but she failed to respond to treatment and grew worse. To relieve the pain she suffered several remedies were tried. Mrs. Tickell lost thirty pounds in weight.

Dr. Lawrence for three days tried every means in his power to cure her and finally he called in Dr. Prior. Dr. Lawrence was as non-plussed as his colleague.

Finally Mrs. Tickell remembered that she had noticed a lizard in the salad, but she thought she had removed it. On the chance that she had still alive, Dr. Prior decided to try his unique experiment and baited her breath.

This operation, Dr. Prior claims, is always successful, provided the same kind of food eaten with the lizard is used.

### HER HUSBAND.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28—Two years of almost ceaseless mental and physical torture ended abruptly for Mrs. John A. Flack, of Abilene, Kan., in a hearing of the Kansas court, when she heard her husband denied the privilege of bail and remanded to a cell to wait rearrangement on a charge that he is a fugitive from justice. He had pleaded guilty to the charge and will be taken back to his old home, where he once served as a probate judge, to answer to an allegation that while cashier of the Abilene State Bank he misappropriated funds estimated at about \$80,000.

When she left court Mrs. Flack, broken in spirit and health, returned to her meagrely furnished apartment in West Hoboken, N. J., and began to pack the few belongings left after her arrest. She is going back to her Kansas home, there to witness the final chapter in her husband's affairs.

"I am going to stick to him," she told those who spoke to her in the courtroom, "if it lasts for the rest of my life."

Two years ago a life affluence, cherished and wealthy friends, an automobile and a home second to none in the Kansas community were at the disposal of Mrs. Flack as the result of her husband's thrift and close application to duty. Then according to her own story, she was astonished when he told her he intended to leave Abilene for a vacation in this city. She agreed to accompany him.

After three weeks here her husband's nervousness began to arouse her suspicions. Without any explanation he told her to return home, and that he was going to Texas. She reached Detroit, only to be met at the train by a relative, who showed her newspapers explaining that her husband was many thousand dollars short in his accounts at the bank and was being sought by the police.

Mrs. Flack continued her journey to her home. The authorities had taken possession and sold all but a few of the family's effects to satisfy the bank's claim. Both denied that the amount involved is \$80,000. They placed it at \$35,000 and declared their property confiscated must have covered the entire amount.
