THE CANADIAN NAVAL POLICY—WHAT IS BEST?

The Insurance Chronicle of Montreal in a recent issue had an able and timely article on this subject, based upon an address given by Mr. Williams, the President of the Political Economy Club. Mr. Williams had emphasized the facts that the new German navy can have but one rational object that the whole trend of German politics is toward a war with Great Britain, and that the German breadboughts with their trifling coal-carrying capacity are manifestly intended for use in the North Sea alone.

He further pointed out that the colonial expansion so essential to Germany's progress is frustrated at every point by British occupation, that Germany's industrial development is retarded by British competition, that German naval supremacy, which is the confessed ambition of the Kaiser, can only be achieved in one way, by seizing the trident which for a century past has been held by Britain; and that when the struggle comes the fate of Canada as well as that of the British Empire will hang in the balance.

THE GROWING VALUE OF AN APPLE ORCHARD.

The Toronto Globe tells that a forty-acre orchard with 1,200 winter apple trees on it in Norfolk county, has just been sold for \$17,000. Now that is a good price for forty acres of land, being \$425 per acre. Or if instead of area alone, we consider the land and the trees together as making the value, then we shall have an acre of land with 30 apple trees on it as value for \$425. Each of the 1,200 trees, with the land allotted to it, was worth \$14.

The purchaser of the orchard is a practical fruit-grower, and he credits himself with having got a bargain. This is easily understood when one learns that the returns this year from the Norfolk apple orchards run as high in some cases as \$300 per acre. Compare this with the value of a live area in wheat, oats or potatoes. Note, too, how a young orchard grows into value. Eighteen years ago that forty-acre orchard was sold for \$2,750, ten years ago for \$4,500 and four years ago for \$10,000.

We repeat the story of the Ontario orchard because we have just as good his son after him has neglected, and in Norfolk, Ontario and can produce quite as good winter apples as are grown there. There is no reason why there might not be an equal increase in the value of a forty-acre orchard here as in Ontario—nearly eight fold in eighteen years. But whosoever would realize upon such happy prospects must begin with a right location and have the soil carefully prepared, he must plant trees adapted to our climate and whose fruit has good market value, and he must care for them until they reach the producing age.

The hard part of it is the long wait for results. We plant oats or potatoes and at one brief summer's end gather in a ten or twenty-fold increase. For the orchard one must wait. Perchance it may be that a father has planted an orchard, which his son after him has neglected, and so the labor of years ago has come

An additional breadbought or two in the North Sea might save the Empire at the critical moment from defeat and disaster. Fortunately no irrevocable decision has yet been reached at Ottawa and we hope and trust that Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his colleagues are still keeping an open mind and an ear to the ground. If we mistake not the breadbought idea has taken a dead hold upon many thoughtful minds throughout Canada.

to naught. Yet there is today no better prospect of profit gathering from the field than by apple-growing with the due care and attention given, and the philosophical temperament in an owner who has learned to labor and to wait.

Among the experimental farms is one at Lethbridge, Alberta. Of course, at these farms where seed, soil and cultivation are all supposed to be at their best, big crops are raised. What strikes one in connection with the Alberta farm is the much larger yield on irrigated land. For instance potatoes, a non-irrigated land produced 168 bushels, and on irrigated land 418 bushels. But this irrigation is a costly job. Down here in Prince Edward Island the clouds usually supply sufficient moisture without irrigation.

There is the usual quarrel over the public accounts between parties in New Brunswick. The Hazen Government is to be commended for making public the Auditor General's report early. It deals with the year ended with October last, and makes out a surplus for the year on ordinary account of \$4,444. Mr. Robinson, the opposition leader, claims that instead of this small surplus, the Province has really a deficit of \$73,000 on the year's transactions.

In these days when the wholesale destruction of the forests is causing grave concern and treplanting is being urged as a public necessity, it is complained that more young trees are being yearly cut down for Christmas trees than are being planted. The demands of the holiday season call for millions of young trees every year. The spruce tree is the favorite in this regard, and on 25th December its outshines the beloved Canadian maple in popularity.

During the past year an army of twenty-five to thirty thousand men were employed in railway construction, 17,000 of these being engaged in work on the Transcontinental Railway. This is better than having an army engaged in warfare or resting in barracks. Seven hundred miles of the eighteen hundred between Moncton and Winnipeg are now laid with steel and some four hundred miles more are graded. This leaves seven hundred yet to be graded and railed and the Quebec bridge to be built in completion of the work.

He had been dead for hours. The left arm was filled with green and broken like above his head. There were no marks of violence on the body.
