### CALLS FOR MARTIAL LAW ON THE ITALIAN FOOD SUPPLY.

ROME, Oct. 23.—The first week's session of Parliament ended in a stormy discussion of the food situation during which Deputy Canepa, the outgoing food controller, said the only way to regulate the National provisions problem was to place all agricultural supplies under martial law, no freedom being allowed to dealers in fixing prices.

The Government, he declared, should take over the issuing of all food tickets. Italian sugar and meat consumption, Deputy Canepa said, had been reduced 50 per cent without injuring public health.

## WHOLESALE DEALERS TO REGISTER

OTTAWA, Oct. 23.—Announcement was made last night that all wholesale dealers in fruit and vegetables must register with the Food Controller by November 1st. Dealers failing to register make themselves liable to a fine of \$1,000, or imprisonment for three months, or both fine and imprisonment. The term "wholesale dealer" includes all persons handling fruit and vegetables between the bona fide grower and the bona fide retail dealer.

Wholesale dealers in fruit and vegetables who have not already received registration cards may secure them upon application to the Food Controller's office.

Authority to take such action was given by an Order-in-Council issued on the 11th inst.

### How Potato Prices Compare.

Correspondents of the Food Controller's office yesterday telegraphed the following reports on the potato situation. The quotations (unless otherwise stated) are wholesale per ninety pound bag.

In Ottawa, Ontario potatoes sold at \$2.10 yesterday, while in Toronto, they sold at \$1.60. At Montreal, prices for Quebec, New Brunswick and Ontario potatoes were \$2.25, \$2.30 and \$2.00, respectively. In Quebec City, Quebec potatoes sold at \$1.90 to \$2.10, with no New Brunswick potatoes on the market.

At Halifax, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island potatoes sold at \$1.50 to \$1.75. Western Nova Scotia farmers received \$1.50, while those in eastern Nova Scotia got \$1.20. At St. John, New Brunswick local potatoes sold at \$2.20, with the market

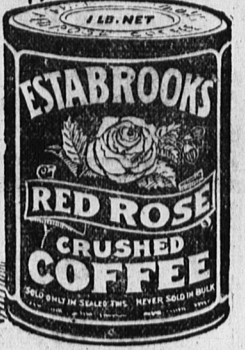
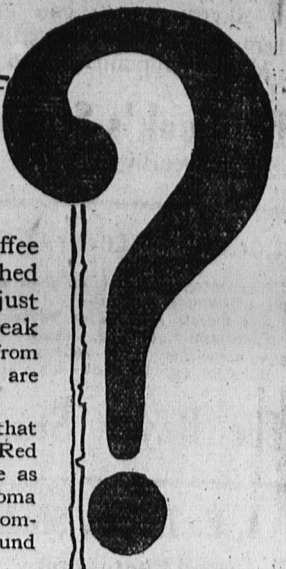

## Directions for Employers

### Who Purpose Claiming Exemption for Class One Men in Their Employ

THE following course is recommended for employers who have in their employ any number of men—bachelors and widowers without children (not otherwise excepted) who were 20 years old on the 13th October, 1917, and whose 34th birthday did not occur before Jan. 1st, 1917, and who propose claiming exemption for any of these men, to continue in work which is deemed to be in the National interest:

First, it will simplify matters for you and for the exemption tribunals if you instruct Class One men in your employ to go up for medical examination at the nearest Medical Board Centre.

Only Class One men, who upon medical examination are placed in Category A are liable for immediate service under the Act. Class One men placed in Categories B, C or E satisfy immediate requirements if they attach their medical report to their claim for exemption.

### Employer's Statement and Schedule

Second, prepare a full statement of the total number of your employees grouping them according to their respective occupations and qualifications and stating the number in each group. Indicate the possibility or otherwise of replacing the labour of Class One men with the labour of those unavailable for military service, or outside the statutory class called up; the extent to which the withdrawal of men in the statutory class would affect the business, the reason for considering that the carrying on of the business is in the National interest, and such other facts and circumstances as may appear to be relevant.

Append to this general statement and classification, a schedule of the names, ages and occupations of all men in Class One, indicating as to those who have been medically examined, the medical Category in which they have been placed, noting against each name whether or not you propose to claim exemption on behalf of the man.

Where exemption is claimed employer should state his opinion whether such exemption should be conditional on the man's continuing to follow his present occupation and whether it would suffice if exemption were granted for one, two or more months, as the case may be.

A copy of both statement and schedule should be prepared for each man for whom the employer is applying for exemption.

### Forms for Exemption

These forms may be obtained on request from any Post Master, who will transmit the forms when filed in, to the Registrar.

Claims for exemption must be made not later than November 10th.
