TUESDAY. SAD NEWS—Mrs. Benj. Carter, city, has received the sad news of the death of her sister, Carrie, the wife of Mr. John T. Cudmore, which took place at California, on Friday, Oct. 3, 1913, in the forty-sixth year of her age. She leaves to mourn a sorrowing husband, two sisters, Mrs. Benj. Carter, of this city, and Mrs. Geo. Cudmore of Necheart, Montana, and one brother, Richard H. Inch, of Winnipeg.

CHAUFFEUR SUSPENDED.—An infraction of the motor vehicle law which has just occurred has been taken serious notice of by the Government, who have meted out swift and just punishment to the wrong-doer. The offence was committed on the 9th inst., Thursday last, and the offender is Chauffeur Everett Woods, of Charlottetown. It appears that he drove his car out on the Brackley Point road, which as is known, is not one of the roads along which motor vehicles are permitted to run. Information was laid with the Government that the law had been violated in this manner, and inquiries proved the truth of the complaint. The tracks of a motor-car's tires were plainly traced along the road, and as the result of this, the Government invoked the assistance of the Motor Vehicle Association in the identity of the offender. There was no attempt at concealment. It was admitted that an offence was committed but it was urged that it was done in mistake, and that as soon as the chauffeur had discovered his error he had turned back. In consequence, the Government, in pursuance of their determination to protect the public by seeing that the Motor Vehicle Law is properly carried out, have suspended Woods' license for six months from date. In the letter to Woods in which he is informed of his suspension as chauffeur, the Provincial Secretary states: "The Government is determined to protect the public by punishing all violations of the Motor Vehicle Law, whether such violation be intentional, through ignorance or by mistake."

WEDNESDAY. P. W. C. DEBATE.—The Prince of Wales Debating Society held their weekly debate on Tuesday, Oct. 14. The topic of discussion was—"He solved that man in a creature of circumstances rather than the architect of his own fortune". The speakers were, Pro. D. MacArthur, L. Webster, R. Brown, Con. P. Keeping, Margaret MacQuarrie, P. Walsh. After the vote, which stood 30-29 in favor of the negative the critic, P. Landrigan expressed himself as well pleased with the debate.

This fact was stated by Dr. Conroy, one of the directors of the company, yesterday; as in the absence of the chairman it became his duty to countersign the cheques for the payment of the shareholders' dividends. A duty which, as he stated, was a very pleasant one indeed.

WEDDED.—A pretty wedding took place in St. Malachi's Church, Kirkcubria, yesterday morning when Miss Mary Donnelly, daughter of Mr. John Donnelly, of Albany, was united in marriage to Mr. George Emmett Croken, Cape Traverse. The ceremony was performed by Rev. D. P. Croken, Georgetown, brother of the groom.

CONFIRMATION.—His Lordship Bishop O'Leary, and Father Plus Macdonald returned to Charlottetown, Monday night from Kinkora and Seven Mile Bay, where His Lordship was administering Confirmation. On Sunday morning last about 103 candidates were confirmed. Monday morning the Bishop made his first visit to Seven Mile Bay and was royally received. An appropriate address was read to which His Lordship responded fittingly. At this place 103 candidates also had the Sacrament of Confirmation conferred upon them.

TEMPTING OFFERS.—AT the annual special meeting of the Dalton Silver Black Fox Co., Ltd., yesterday, Mr. Walter B. Prowse, one of the directors who also fills the office of secretary-treasurer, in acknowledging his re-election to the directorate, made some interesting statements to the shareholders. In pointing out how important the company's success was to him, since he was practically the one who started that organization, he said that the work he had set out to accomplish was the placing of the company on a sound and successful basis, and that as that had not yet been achieved he felt it his duty to accept re-election as a director and stay by the company for a year longer at least, it meant considerable financial loss to him. He had been offered \$20,000 if he would resign from the Dalton company and put in six months' work which another company and another offer he had received was \$10,000 for four months' work. His answer to those offers had been that so long as the Dalton company would pay him the \$20,000 a year that he was now receiving from them he would stay with them. But that which he had before him for accomplishment was not far off, and the probability was that after next year they would have to find a director in his place.

PERSIAN SHEEP.—Mr. Walter Jones, Charlottetown, left yesterday by the western train en route to Chicago, Ill., where he will take charge of a consignment of 200 pure bred ewes, which he, together with Dr. C. C. Young and J. R. Dennis are bringing here for fur purposes.

PROCLAMATION.—In the last issue of the Canada Gazette the proclamation is published conveying the date to which Parliament was originally prorogued, October 2nd, and summoning Senators and members of the House of Commons to meet on the 8th November instead.

DEAD IN BRAZIL.—The Oddfellows Lodge of this city have received a communication from the American Consul at Peru, Brazil, informing them of the death there of Mr. Nathaniel Fraser, formerly of Charlottetown. No particulars are given. Deceased was a brother of Mrs. Andrew Duncan.

NEW BUOYS.—Three buoys have recently been placed at the instance of the Dominion Government to define Palmer Inlet, on the North Coast of this Island, a newly formed opening through the sand bars and sand beach five miles south-eastward of Cascumpe light-house. Their position and description are as follows: (1) position.—At entrance of channel, 2 1/2 miles 108 degrees (South 48 degrees 30 minutes Mag.) from Black Point; description.—wooden cask buoy; color.—black. (2) position.—at entrance of channel, 2 1/2 miles, 109 degrees (S. 47 degrees 30 minutes E. Mag.) from Black Point; description.—wooden cask buoy; color.—red. (3) position.—in mid-channel, 2 1/2 miles 111 degrees (S. 45 degrees 30 minutes E. Mag.) from Black Point; description.—wooden cask buoy; color.—black and white.

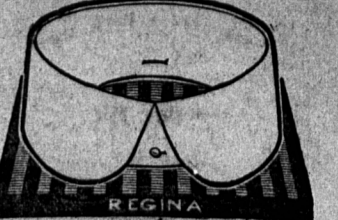

RABBITS PLENTIFUL.—Sportsmen who are looking forward to rabbit-hunting will no doubt be gratified to know that reports from various parts of the province are that rabbits are in abundance, and so there is plenty of good sport ahead in this direction. The close season for rabbit-shooting terminates at the end of the present month. Sportsmen have therefore only a fortnight longer to wait in order to be able legally to hunt Bunny. The rabbits are said to be exceptionally plentiful in the vicinity of Suffolk, and Lots 48 and 30; but it is a fact that they are so very abundant this season that wherever there are woods they are to be found in plenty.

PARTRIDGE SEASON OPENS.—Partridges, which were so scarce yesterday, were taboo with sportsmen on the island, according to the provisions of the Game Act, are from now on, the lawful game of all devotees of the sporting gun. It is stated that the birds are very plentiful, so that gunsmen may expect good sport whenever they should go out for a day with these birds. They are said to be most plentiful in the east and west parts of the Island. One or two of the most ardent sportsmen in the city yesterday intended to take immediate advantage of the raising of the embargo, but the weather was too inclement to make promise of a pleasant tramp among the woods, and the contemplated day's sport was abandoned.

GOLDEN WEDDING.—It does not fall to the happy lot of many couples in any part of the world to celebrate a golden wedding, in other words, the fiftieth anniversary of their wedding day.
