The following article was taken from *The London (England) Morning Post*, Thursday, January 31st, 1905.

To the Editor of "The Morning Post." Sir—About two years ago an accident revealed to me a disinfectant that has an extraordinary controlling power over diphtheria—Cresolene. It would take some five years to collect these, and all this time, cases would perish that might be saved.
