CONSERVATION

A WEEKLY COLUMN OF PRACTICAL OPINIONS ON THE VITAL ISSUES AFFECTING THE USES AND ABUSES OF NATURAL RESOURCES BY MR. LUDLOW JENKINS, MARSHFIELD.

DO NATURAL ENEMIES DESTROY MORE GAME THAN HUNTERS? Such is the claim made by many of those who try to place the blame for steady reduction in game stocks on any agent rather than on the hunter. There occurs to us at once, however, a number of reasons why we should be wary of accepting this claim at face value. A general argument of much force is that game stocks and their natural enemies evolve together, evidently achieved mutual adjustment of numbers, and maintained their average populations until man's influence became pronounced. He interfered not only by selective killing but also by working changes in the environment. Without man in the equation, game and predators both thrived; with him as a factor, both natural enemies and game species suffered, but the latter most obviously so. It is difficult to draw any conclusion from the long-time record other than that man as both directly and indirectly responsible for the dwindling of stocks of game animals. Another point usually evaded by those defending the record of hunters as against that of natural enemies, is that the predators take their toll largely from the ranks of the immature, while hunters chiefly the adult, and in the young is a general rule in Nature; in fact, in each generation all perishes except enough on the average to replace the parent stock. In all game animals this means that the natural process is survival of only two adults in each generation. If hunters killed the young and those alone, the effect might not be noticed; but when they kill adults, they are eliminating the already highly selected and precious breeding reserve upon which continuance of the race depends. Grouse or ducks can better lose several young than one adult, and the proportion increases in some groups as in most fishes, where perishing of hundreds, even thousands, of immature has less effect on the population than the elimination of a single adult. These partly theoretical considerations may not appeal to some minds as much as more concrete presently observed, case of the inter-relationships of hunters, natural enemies, and game species. If natural enemies were the factor causing shortage of game why is it that game is observed to increase in areas where hunting is excluded but all other unfavorable conditions remain? Illustrations of this occurrence may be seen in suburban and parked areas of many cities, where natural enemies of quail, as rats, squirrels, dogs and cats, are abundant; but the quail maintain themselves in greater numbers than on equivalent areas of farmland. The reason seems very clear; there is no hunting. The same result was exemplified on a large scale by the increase of quail in Ohio under state-wide protection of the birds from hunting. They were not shot, except to a slight extent illegally, and in 18 years are known to have increased fivefold. Natural enemies no doubt carried on as usual but as hunting was stopped the quail population constantly tended toward the normal maximum. If hunters will only admit these facts and plead for reduction in natural enemies under certain conditions so that more of the young of game species which they chiefly destroy may grow up for hunters to kill, they will be well advised. It does their cause no good to charge that natural enemies are responsible for reduction in game stock when the fact that hunters themselves are responsible is apparent to any thinking person.
