In the three-legged race, five teams started, Hennigan and Beer, making a lovely run to win easily. Scott and McCormack and Biggar and McLaine almost ran an even race, the former team just getting the verdict.

The shot put had five entries with Mayor F. J. Arnett of Summerside leading off with a 25 foot ten inch put, the event being won by Biggar at 35 feet 4 1/2 inches and McLaine almost ran an even race, the former team just getting the verdict.

The potato race was by far the most interesting of the day, it being declared a tie between Hennigan and Scott, Hennigan winning on the toss.

The quarter mile relay race was won by S. Biggar, G. Hennigan, and W. Scott, Amherst, second.

Shower of Golden Coins

(By British United Press) ROME, August 20.—A chance blow from the pick of a labourer working on the foundations of a new house in the eastern region of Rome recently brought down a shower of golden coins on the astonished worker's head. These coins have proved to be the most important and most complete addition in modern times to specimens of money of the earliest centuries of the Imperial epoch.

The point of the discovery near the Via Salaria which traverses the area has so far been comparatively little explored by archaeologists, but it is known to contain a vast number of sites of pagan sepulchres of the earliest centuries.

It was one such private family tomb that the labourer struck, and the money poured from a burial terracotta vase that his pick inadvertently smashed.

Altogether 250 pieces, all of the highest currency value, were found, forming a complete series of the gold issues of the reigns of the Emperors Trajan, Hadrian, Antonine, and Marcus Aurelius. The money is in a perfect state of preservation with all inscriptions easily legible and practically unaltered.

The discovery could not be concealed, and the police soon had complete knowledge of the find. The collection is not yet catalogued in detail, as the coins are at present being kept in the hands of the Questura, pending official report and the appointment of a committee of experts from the King, who is recognized as one of the leading numismatists of Europe, has not yet handed the find to the Rome National Museum, filling exactly many lacunae in the famous collection of imperial coins housed therein.
