Rev. John Prince, the aged Methodist divine, says the Moncton Times, passed away last night at his home, corner of Church and Union Streets. Mr. Prince was taken sick on Friday last with a severe cold. His illness was not considered by his friends to be dangerous, however, until within the last day or two, when pneumonia developed and the patient showed evidences of weakening very rapidly. Mr. Prince himself did not realize his serious condition until yesterday and his death therefore came somewhat as a surprise to his friends. The deceased, notwithstanding his advanced age, was in full possession of his faculties to the last. A short time before his death, which occurred between ten and eleven o'clock, he conversed with his medical attendants and members of his family. His demise will be learned with very deep regret by the wide circle of friends and acquaintances to whom a life of Christian usefulness had endeared him.

Rev. John Prince was perhaps the oldest clergyman in Westmorland county. He was born in Moncton on the 11th of June, 1820, and his 80th birthday, which occurred last June, was made the occasion of a very pleasant reunion by many of his friends. He was then in the enjoyment of very good health, and few expected that he would so soon be called to join the great majority. Of him it may truly be said that a good man has been called hence. The Rev. John Prince was lineally descended and of the eighth generation from Rev. John Prince, graduate of Oxford, who in the early part of the seventeenth century was rector of East Stafford, Berkshire County, England. His wife was the daughter of Dr. Tolberry. The eldest of his sons, John Prince, junior, having spent two or three years at Oxford university, emigrated to Massachusetts in 1633, and is the ancestor of most of those who bear his name in New England and the British Provinces. The clergyman, just deceased, was a son of the late Thos. Prince, Esq., and received his early education partly in such a college as then existed in Moncton and partly at Fredericton under the direction of the late Fredric Miles and the late Charles Tupper, D. D. In the year 1896 Mr. Prince was received on trial by the British Conference, then having control of Methodist affairs in these colonies, being appointed to the Pownal circuit in Prince Edward Island; and after the usual probation of four years he was ordained as a Wesleyan Minister in the old Centenary church, St. John. He entered upon the work of the ministry with great zeal and labored upon some of the most important circuits in the Province, as well as in Newfoundland, where he was stationed at St. John's and Carboneau. The Berwick camp meeting, which has become such an institution of Methodism, was originated by him. The honors of the domination were freely bestowed upon him in his more active days. In 1874, he was elected with others as a delegate to the First General Conference held in the Metropolitan Church, Toronto, under the presidency of the late Rev. Edgerton Byrson, D. D., and in 1877 was elected president of the Conference of New Brunswick and P. E. Island, after having held the offices of Financial Secretary, and Chairman of District. Recently the conference fittingly acknowledged Mr Prince's completion of a half century in the ministry. In 1879 through failing health brought on by the severity of his labors, Mr Prince was obliged to ask the conference to relieve him from permanent circuit duties but though down to the very last he willingly performed work, it was sometimes thought in excess of his physical ability, frequently driving many miles into the country to conduct religious services.

Mr. Prince was twice married. His first wife was Miss Ann J. Embree, daughter of the late Thomas Embree Esq. of Amherst, by whom he had two daughters, Mrs. George H. Barnes, of Sussex Vale and Mrs. John W. Hickman of Amherst. His second wife, who survives him, is the relict of the late Mariner Wood of Sackville, who will have the sincere sympathy of a wide circle of friends in her great bereavement.

GREAT COAL STRIKE.

Hard coal region will be silent for days.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Sept. 4. The executive board of the United Mine Workers of America has issued a general strike order for the anthracite coal region of Pennsylvania. The order was issued at 5.30 o'clock this morning, and the strike is to occur on Monday next. The order is signed by John Mitchell, president, and W. B. Wilson, secretary and treasurer.

Regarding the strike and his plans President Mitchell said: "I shall go to Hazleton, Pa., next Saturday night I will take some of the office force and open headquarters in Hazleton. I shall address mass meetings throughout the anthracite fields during the strike."

"My information today is that in the first anthracite district 75,000 men will go out at once. In the seventh district 18,000 of the 20,000 men are ready to strike, and in the ninth we have 44,500 men ready to quit. Our board members will be on the field. All efforts possible will be made to avert trouble. I shall direct the strike. It is hard to tell how long the men will hold out, as you know how cheap a miner can live until he has been put on the trial."

"This strike is the largest one ever ordered, affecting directly 1,000,000 wage-earners whose earnings are over \$10,000,000 a week. To-morrow we shall issue an appeal to the American people asking moral support and sympathy. I realize that the public sympathy is a great help in a battle such as we have inaugurated tonight."
