Cameron of Toronto, Secretary of The General Board of Missions of The Presbyterian Church in Canada who has recently returned from a visit to the Presbyterian Mission in South India. The Rev. Canon O. H. Wilkinson, senior Anglican Missionary of the Kangara Mission in North India. He is a Canon of Lahore Cathedral and in 1943 the Government of India awarded him the Kaiser-I-Hind Medal for outstanding service to India. Dr. Jessie Findlay, Baptist Missionary for thirty-seven years in India at the Vellore Medical College. Miss Ada Sandell, Reg. N. a Unitarian Church Missionary Nurse from Korea. Rev. John Ting, B. A. of China recently appointed Missionary Secretary of The Student Christian Movement of Canada to serve at the various Canadian University centres. Arrangements have been made for these leaders to address groups of boys and girls in the schools and at Prince of Wales College; to nurses to some of the Service Clubs and in all the Churches of the City on Sunday Morning, Afternoon and Evening and on Monday.
