LABOR'S DEMANDS

Chinese and Japs to be Excluded.

AN EIGHT HOUR DAY

And General Alien Law—Sir Wilfrid's Very Cautious Answer.

OTTAWA, April 18.—(Special)—A delegation from the Trades and Labor Congress waited on the Premier and asked for exclusion of the Japanese and Chinese; the placing of a \$500 poll tax on Chinese; the adoption of an eight hour day on government works; an alien labor law against all countries and the establishment of a bureau of statistics.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier seemed to look favorably on an increase of the Chinese tax, but he thought England would not look with favor on any anti-Japanese legislation while the International Conference was considering the alien labor law.

MAYOR OF ST JOHN.

MINISTER FIELDING

Continues The Debate on Yukon Charges.

MILLS AND OTHERS.

Reply — Accident to Mr. Foster—The Debate Still Going on.

OTTAWA, April 18.—Minister Fielding contributed yesterday one of the best speeches made in the debate on the Yukon charges. He confined himself closely to the question at issue beginning with the discovery of gold in the Klondyke, showing the steps which the Minister of the Interior had taken for the administration of the territory.

The Minister of Finance laid stress upon the point that when Mr. Sifton had arranged for the administration of the Yukon and sent officers there that was all that any Minister could do. He could not be held responsible for what happened after they got there.

Mr. Fielding agreed that Mr. Ogilvie was the proper official to enquire into the charges against officials; that when the opposition had any charges to make against Mr. Sifton or any other minister of the crown, and they preferred these charges in the usual and constitutional way they would very soon be investigated.

In speaking of Sir Hibbert Tupper's attack on Major Walsh he intimated that if the search light was cast upon the private lives of some Conservatives there might be startling revelations. He said the Liberals would not descend to such a warfare. It was left to the Tupper's, father and son, to do so.

After speeches from Mr. Flint of Yarmouth and Dr. Sproule, Mr. Mills of Annapolis continued the debate. He thought Davies and Fielding had exhibited a suspicious amount of heat and fury in their speeches.

Mr. Mills reviewed the conduct of Fielding, in many matters, stating that he had shown himself, on more than one occasion, to be a blatant hypocrite.

Mr. Morris of British Columbia, moved the adjournment.

Mr. Foster met with an accident on Saturday which prevented his appearance in the House yesterday. He struck his head against a beam in his barn, cutting his forehead rather seriously. He was to have spoken at St. Bonaventure last evening, but was unable to do so. Sir Charles Tupper taking his place.

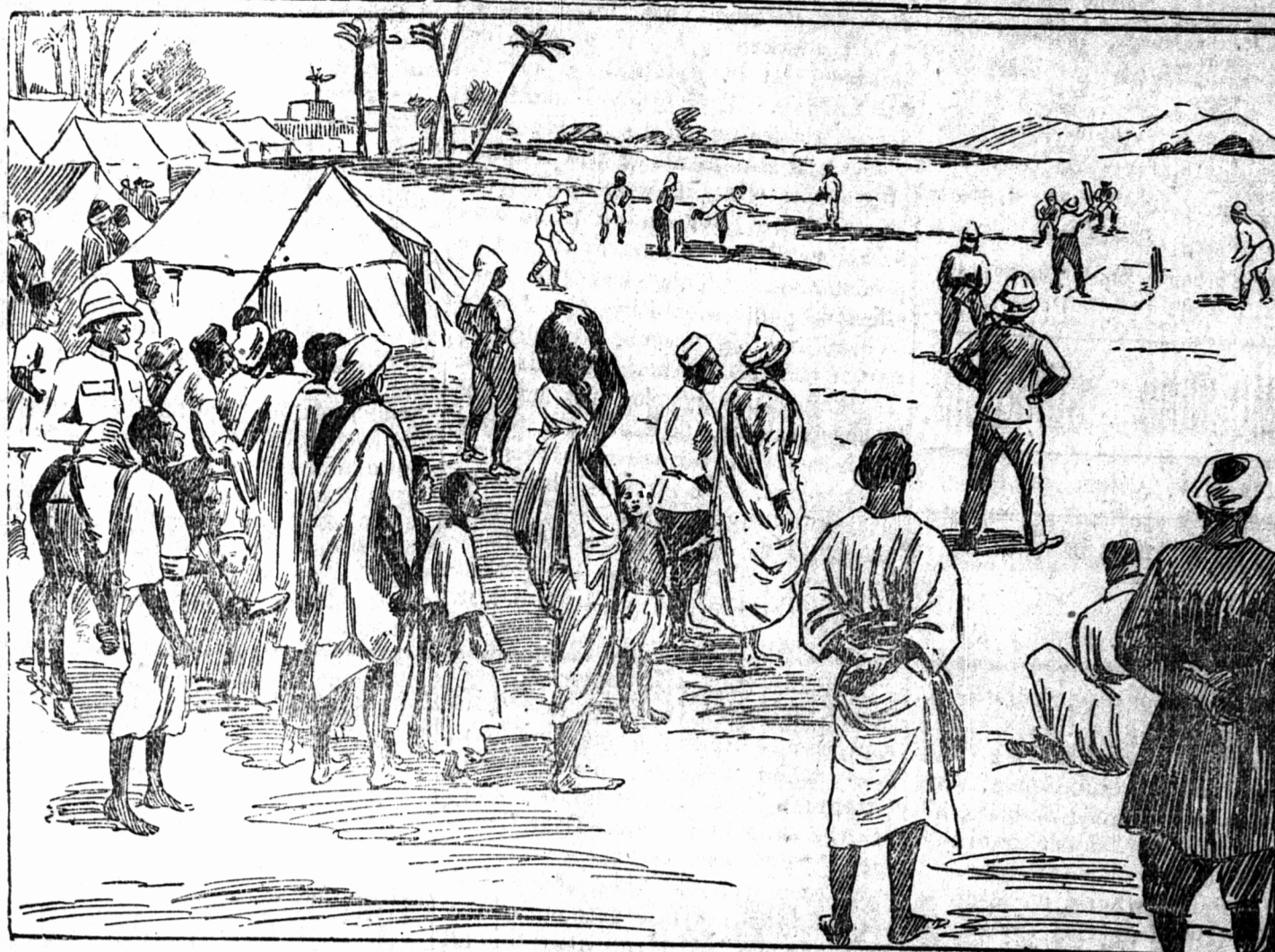
KILLED AT BASEBALL.

IMPROVED SCOTT ACT

Will Be Asked for at Ottawa.

ENABLING PROVINCES

That Want Prohibition to Get it—A Minority Report.

OTTAWA, April 18.—(Special)—A committee from members representing the Dominion Alliance and the prohibition members had a conference this morning.

The decision was to improve the Scott Act so as to enable any province wanting prohibition have it.

The committee will present this scheme to the House, while a minority will report in favor of a straight prohibitory law and demand that the government shall carry out the people's mandate.
