The opening meeting of the Federal Campaign in the coming elections was held at North River Friday night when A. A. Miss Clara Steele who left this city last week for Calgary had rather an unpleasant experience in crossing on the Empress, but fortunately everything turned out right in the end. Miss Steele was leaning over the rail holding her satchel in her hand, containing the railway and pullman tickets of herself and her sister to Calgary, \$300.00 in cash and a gold watch. In some way the satchel became unfastened and fell from her arm into the water, just as the steamer was turning the buoy about two miles from Point du Chene. When the news of the loss of the satchel reached the care of Capt. Cameron, who, immediately sent out a grant lene boat in search. The searchers were rewarded by finding the satchel floating, although if they had delayed much longer, it would have probably become so water soaked that it would have sunk. The feelings of Miss Steele on recovering her property may be imagined.

The loss suffered by the Charlottetown Condensed Milk Co. when their splendid factory and plant was almost completely destroyed by fire early Saturday morning, as reported is estimated, amount to \$30,000 or \$40,000. This is covered by insurance to the amount of \$13,000, \$7,500 of which is carried by companies represented by Horace Hazard and the balance by companies represented by Col. Davison and E. R. Brow. The firemen had a strenuous pull to the scene but nevertheless responded to the call speedily. It required 3,000 feet of hose, on which were three nozzles, to reach the scene. It was not until twenty minutes to eight that the "all-out" bell rang, and the firemen ceased their strenuous efforts. Almost all the contents of the building including a considerable quantity of canned goods were destroyed, the only goods being saved being a number of barrels of sugar. The factory was built about twelve years ago. The manufacture of condensed milk, cream and coffee was carried on, the milk being drawn from a radius of ten or twelve miles. A good market for these products was found in the Maritime Provinces and the Canadian West. About twenty people are thrown out of employment. The directors will hold a meeting to decide on future plans.
