Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age who has resided in the Dominion of Canada for a period of one year in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must be a person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency on certain conditions.
Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of the homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, or certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.
In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 cents extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.
A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 cents extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

ON FURLOUGH

M. Daniel L. Campbell, DeSable, has received the following letter from his son:
3rd C. C. D. Seaford Oct. 7, 1917
Dear Dad:—You will be thinking that I have forgotten you as it is so long since I wrote last, but I have been on the move all the time. Couldn't get settled in one place long enough as there was always something new I kept putting it off till I got back to my depot. I arrived here yesterday night with it, till they kick me out. I have seen enough of France for awhile and was lucky enough to get through it as easy as I did, although I am not feeling any too good yet. Gas certainly is a hard thing to contend with, as there is no way of escaping. A person can have the satisfaction of ducking when he hears a shell coming, but he can't keep his respirator on and fight at the same time, for very long. I had mine on for a couple of hours, but took it off and got along fine until twelve hours afterwards when my eyes began to pain me, so I went to the dressing station and when I got there I could hardly see so they put me on a stretcher and took me right along with them. They kept perfectly still all the time, as it affected my pump and they were scared I would choke. Any way it's all over now and I can say I was all through Vimy Ridge, Arlow, Frienong and Loos on the 15th of Aug. It is only a few but it don't take much to satisfy me. We had fine picking at Loos as our M. G.'s were on a hill and when he tried to come over all we had to do was to lift the safety catch and press the trigger and then watch the poor fellows below. Up to the time I pulled out there were 18 counter attacks and he only got to our front line twice and then there was one day or so. It is a big thing to do, but I don't think it is only kids he puts in his front line to hold it and keeps the good men in the supports. A fellow sure has some fine experiences and see's some fierce sights, but none that made me stop and think so much as when I was in London and saw old women of 80 and little babies of a few months being taken into the under ground for safety. He came over three nights while I was there, the third night he came three times. The police are doing good work there as when the guns started firing there was no one to be seen on the streets, the noise was the worst and the sharp shot from our own guns was breaking the windows all around us, as we stayed on the street just to see what it was like, but the next night I sure took cover and stayed there till about three in the morning, they always bring one or two of his down every trip he takes, but he will always come until they bomb German towns and then he may stop as he will have to keep a lot of his airplanes at home.

There is a lot of talk about peace over here, but I don't think any one knows unless it's old Hindenburg. They can hold out a long while yet, as the prisoners look good as dead, as though they are starving. Well Dear Dad I was going along Piccadilly the other day and met Harrison Shaw he looks fine. There was a lot of the boys there. Willie did not come till later so I missed him. I had a letter from Frank and was surprised to hear of him being in France all summer. I guess we have been in the same dug out together and didn't know it.
Well this is some different here

LOST A MILLION IN JUST THREE YEARS.

MONTREAL, Oct. 12.—About \$335,000 is the amount owing by the Daily Mail Publishing Company, Limited, and the Evening News Company, Limited, of this city, so it was stated here today in the course of proceedings before Mr. Justice Alard in the practice division of the Superior Court, in connection with a meeting of creditors of the two defunct newspapers in question. The creditors number nearly three hundred, of whom one hundred and twenty-five are former employees who claim unpaid salaries. John D. Wallace was appointed liquidator, and five inspectors were appointed. Both the Mail and News were under one management, the News ceasing publication a few months before the Mail, a morning paper, went on the rocks.

As several hundred thousand dollars capital was put into this enterprise, the total loss on the two newspapers in three years is in the neighborhood of a million dollars.

Queen's County Dominion Election

To the Electors of Queens' County,
Ladies and Gentlemen:

Six years ago Mr. A. A. McLean and myself were elected to represent you in the House of Commons. As the result of the election then held the Liberal-Conservative party came into power. During the years that have passed since then I have endeavored to the best of my ability to procure as large a portion as possible of governmental advantages for my native Province. The Government of the party I was elected to support, has done much for the betterment of our trade and commerce and our agricultural interests. It gave us the Car Ferry, increased grants to agriculture, the addition of \$100,000 annually to our provincial subsidy, secured for our Province four members for all time to come, built a number of wharves for the convenience of our farmers and shippers, also dredged the docks at Charlottetown and elsewhere.

When it is considered that for over three years of this period, the Dominion revenues have been urgently required for war purposes, I feel assured that our efforts are not unappreciated by the people of the Province, irrespective of party. I am convinced that what has been done will prove a lasting benefit to the Province and will afford a great impetus to our future prosperity.

During the last session of Parliament I was pleased to support Sir Robert Borden in his endeavors to unite the two great political parties which divide Canada in one Government. Such a consummation would insure a more vigorous prosecution of the war, and would be the means of raising with the least possible friction the necessary recruits to go to the assistance of our hard pressed brave boys at the front.

I am highly gratified that a Union Government has now been formed. It is composed of the strongest men of both parties and shall have my full support.

At the last session of Parliament an Act was passed establishing machinery for the holding of a Dominion election. It provided for the appointment of enumerators to make up lists of voters for all the polls. These will shortly be appointed. May I be permitted to request that every possible assistance be given the enumerators in the preparation of these lists, so that everyone in the County, entitled to a vote, shall have his or her name on the lists before polling day.

In thus giving an account of my Stewardship, permit me to state I shall be candidate for this Country at the coming election.

The crisis which involves our Country is the most important in its history. It devolves upon everyone to consider well the issue raised: are the people of Canada to leave unsupported our brave boys at the Front, who have so long and so well fought for the preservation of our rights and liberties, and whose splendid deeds of heroism have covered Canada with glory and renown? It is impossible.

I respectfully ask for the votes of all true and loyal men and women of this large and intelligent County of Queens', assuring them that the best interests of our province and especially our soldiers shall have at all times my sincere support.
