### PRESIDENT OF STEEL TRUST RESIGNS

(Continued from page 1.)  
The first president of the United States Steel Corporation was Charles H. Schwab who, following his resignation, became president of the Bethlehem Steel Company. Mr. Corey has served seven years. In his statement Judge Corey says:  
"The resignation will be presented to the board for consideration and action in due time, and the finance committee will then present its recommendations concerning the subject matter. It is the present opinion of the members of the finance committee that there should not be elected a successor as president in the immediate future, if at all. The experience and talents of Mr. Corey have best fitted him to take charge of the commercial and manufacturing departments and his attention has been largely confined to that service. However, as the manufacturing companies are all thoroughly equipped with the very best talent, including such as the above mentioned branches need, the strength of the organization will not be diminished. The finance committee may recommend the

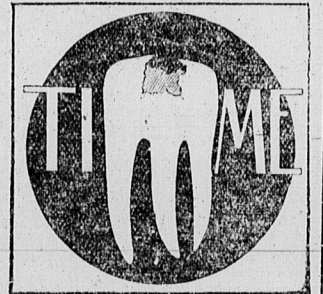
election of a vice-president or two vice-presidents who will be elected to take special charge of different departments.  
Mr. Corey severs his connection with a feeling of loyalty to and friendship for the corporation and all its interests, and takes with him the best wishes of all who are connected with the companies above referred to.  
Something like a year ago the committee and of the chairman of the board of directors, both of which Mr. Gary is, were enlarged to include not only the administrative affairs of the corporation, but the details of executive management. Un- therefore, or another chairman succeeds Mr. Gary, he becomes chief authority over all provinces of the largest steel corporation in the world.  
So far as could be learned Mr. Corey was not in town tonight and no statement from him could be had. It was said that he left town over the holidays and had not returned.

The following is from the Victoria County News, Perth, N. B., Dec. 15: The case against John Craigie, of P. E. I., and William Curry, of New Glasgow, N. S., charged with stealing sixteen pounds from G. Townsend, of Perth, on Wednesday night, Nov. 23rd, was ended quickly when brought before Judge Carleton, of the County Court, under the speedy trials act at Andover on Wednesday, Nov. 30th. After questioning the prisoners on some of the points of the evidence, His Honor discharged Curry, and sentenced Craigie to two years at Dorchester.

Yesterday morning Mr. Vandermine, the City Collector, applied before John A. McDonald, Judge of the City Court, in behalf of the city for judgment against the lands of Francis McKay, John Drake, Alexander Horne and the estate of John P. Tanton for unpaid assessments for concrete sidewalks laid down in the years 1907 and 1908. The defendants applied for leave to show cause why judgments should not be granted upon the grounds that no proper assessment had been levied and no legal notice given to them of the said assessment. After considerable discussion by counsel, the judge allowed the defendants to be heard and to give evidence by affidavit or alleging new matter to support their defence. The cases were continued until the afternoon when same were adjourned until Saturday evening next at 7.30 o'clock. J. J. Johnson, K. C., appeared for the City of Charlottetown, and A. A. McLean, K. C., W. S. Stewart, K. C., and J. A. Matheson, K. C., appeared for the contesting tax payers.

It is with feelings of sorrow but not without hope that The Guardian chronicles the death of Lydia M. Nicholson, which occurred at the home of her uncle Arch Ferguson, Summerfield, Lot 67, on Dec. 31st, 1910. Deceased was only twenty-one years of age highly esteemed and beloved by all who knew her. 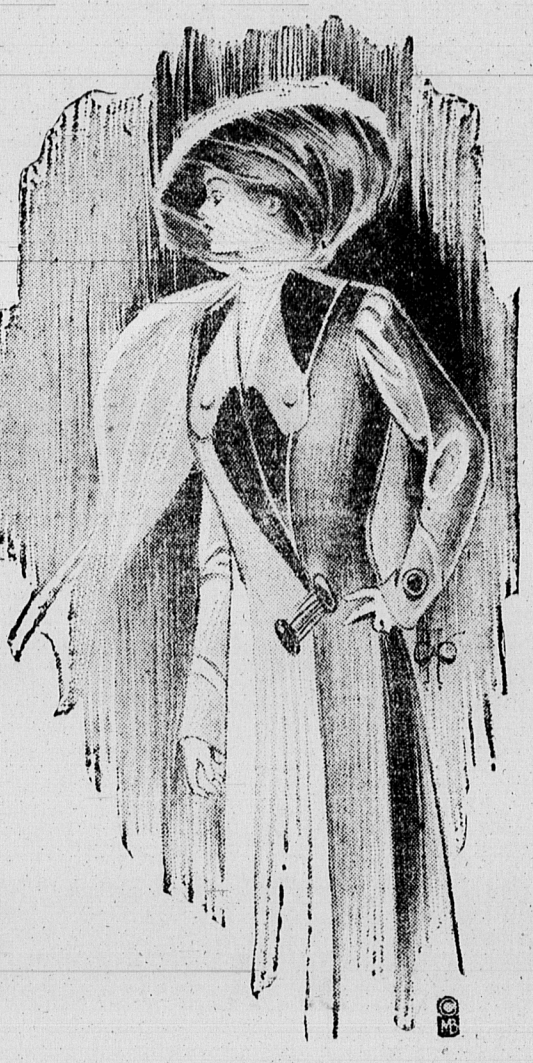
