On the subject and the latter has no intention at present of opening a constituency in New Brunswick. It has been rumored that Hon. A. B. Copp, Secretary of State, would go to the Senate. The rumor is discounted as the Government does not want to open Westernland.
OTTAWA, Feb. 27.—Hon. A. B. Copp, Secretary of State, is not going to resign from the Government. Moreover, he has no present desire for either a judicial or senatorial appointment.
Mr. Copp, who returned from New Brunswick today, denied absolutely rumors of his retirement from the Government which were circulated following a conference between him and Premier Venlot of New Brunswick, and other prominent Liberals of that province on Saturday last.

Therefore, not only in the spirit of the men, but in the cause for which they fought in both conflicts was there an analogy. By their deeds the Canadian soldiers had established a tradition upon which will be founded the future greatness of the country.

Over 500,000 Cotton Workers May Be Idle
(British United Press)
LONDON, Feb. 27.—The Master Cotton Spinners' Federation has unanimously agreed that unless an end to their refusal to allow their members to work at Thornton Mills, Royton, the federation will close all mills until they do. This will throw 500,000 people out of work immediately and 500,000 more in the near future.
The dispute arose from a demand of the workers for increased wages for tending extra machines, the difference amounting to three shillings and ten pence per week.

N. Y. Modernists Will Make Use of Radio

NEW YORK, Feb. 27.—A modernist Bible class, whose teachings will be broadcast by radio through the United States at 8 p. m. every Sunday will be opened on March 2nd, the Rev. Charles Francis Potter, pastor of West Side Unitarian Church announced today.
Dr. Potter is a pronounced opponent of Dr. John Roach Straton, pastor of Calvary Baptist Church and champion of Fundamentalism in New York.
The Modernist Bible class with its broadcasting program was described by Dr. Potter as intended to offset the attacks of Fundamentalists. "Truth at any cost," will be its motto, Dr. Potter said. Noted expounders of Modernism are to address the classes.

Mussolini Will Keep up Italy's Fighting Forces

ROME, Feb. 27.—Premier Mussolini's speech to the Italian Chamber Tuesday, in which he indicated Italy's moral policy contained nothing but logical conclusions drawn from the failure of the naval conference, says the Messagero today. In other words, says the Journal Italy's navy must be prepared; hence she must increase her naval and aerial forces and construct light vessels, submarines and airplanes as much as possible with her financial means. Thus she will pay no heed to the demand of England and United States that poorer countries abandon the construction of submarines and build only capital ships, especially as the latter are inaccessible owing to cost.

Duke of Atholl in Joking Mood

LONDON, Feb. 27.—The Duke of Atholl, president of the Scottish Conservative Association and husband of the House of Commons for Perth and Kinross, spoke at Glasgow today of having recently listened in the House of Lords to "those bony-handed sons of toil," Lord Haldane and Lord Parmoor.
"When I first knew Lord Parmoor," said the Duke of Atholl, "he was a Conservative. Then he became a Liberal. God knows what he is now."
Lord Haldane is the Lord Chancellor in the Labor Government and Lord Parmoor is the new Lord President of the Council.

The plan is similar to the German system which never worked successfully. But the writer says that the confusion resulting from such an attempt when it was tried in Germany could be avoided here by fixing prices in dollars or pounds, and permitting Frenchmen to buy on the basis of twenty-five francs to the pound upon showing his identity card. This would make the French shopkeeper slowly increase his prices in foreign values, as the Germans have become.

British Agriculture Minister's Statement Causes Surprise

LONDON, Feb. 27.—Considerable surprise is expressed in agricultural circles at the statement of the Minister of Agriculture that Canadian cattle are below the standard of British cattle, and for this reason the offer of Canadian cattle to restock Cheshire farms cannot be considered.
Farmers maintain that the refusal of the government is merely a sop thrown to the agricultural interests of the remainder of the country, especially Scotland, where the wage subsidy question will undoubtedly arise in the very near future. Experts who have closely examined recent shipments of Canadian cattle maintain that there are no better beasts in the world of this type. It is becoming more and more obvious that the immediate duty of the Canadian government is to establish examining officials at Canadian ports to prevent the export of unhealthy or low grade cattle.

New Ruling Made at Conference of Leading Horsemen
MONTREAL, Feb. 27.—Horses which race on fair grounds in Canada are not eligible to go onto United States race tracks as unrecorded starters, although this classification is permitted by the Canadian National Trotting Association. This was the situation which developed from the annual meeting of the St. Lawrence fairs circuit which was held here yesterday.
The National Trotting Association, the United States organization, was represented by M. Gocher, secretary of Hartford, Conn.
It was finally decided to allow members of the circuit to make individual choice as to the association under whose rules they would run their horses.
Fairs in eastern Ontario and Quebec were set for the following dates:
Joliette, August 7, 8 to 9; Valleyfield, August 12, 13, 14 and 15; Three Rivers, August 19, 20, 21 and 22; Sherbrooke, August 26, 27, 28 and 29; Quebec, September 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5; Ottawa, September 9, 10, 11 and 12; Kingston, September 15, 16, 17, 18, 19 and 20.
Cornwall was announced as a new member of the circuit. The fair will be held in that city on September 25, 26 and 27.
Closing records for entries were: Trols, 2.14 and 2.18; pace, 2.20 and 2.13. Entries to be in by May 1, Puris \$1,000, and fee 3 per cent.
Officers of the circuit elected were:—Dr. J. H. Vignault, Three Rivers, President; C. Guilbault, Joliette, vice-President; Joseph Fortier, St. Scholastique, Secretary.
