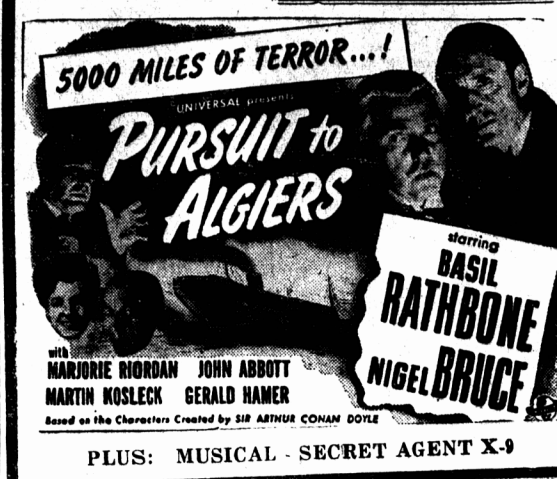

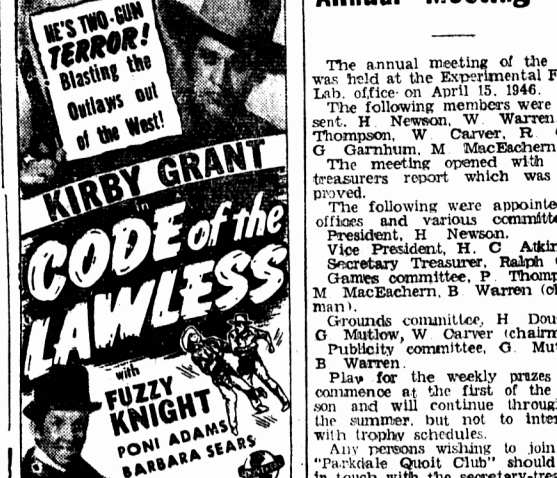

**USE EGG SHELLS TO MOULD CANDLES**

Brighten up your dining table with some egg-shaped candles that can be easily moulded from scraps of old candles, paraffin and crayons.

An egg shell is suggested as the mould for the candle. All you do is puncture a tiny hole at the tip so that a piece of twine can be passed through. At the blunt end, make a large hole. Shake contents out, rinse, and let dry. The membrane on inside of shell should be left intact. After shell is dry, a piece of twine is threaded through the

small hole and out the large one for a wick. Set shell with the large hole up and hold it in place with a rag.

Prepare wax by melting candle stubs or odd bits of paraffin. You can colour wax by melting in a piece of coloured wax crayon. Pour liquid wax into egg shell mould and let cool. As wax cools it will shrink and more wax should be added until it is flush with top. When wax has set, wick should be trimmed and shell cracked and peeled off. Any irregularities in candles can be rubbed with the hands to smooth out. It is also fun to decorate the candles' with oil paint.

To make the candlestick holder, you'll need a 3-4-inch board and part of a tin can. Cut pattern for tin section of holder out of paper and then fasten to tin with some scotch tape. Cut out metal with tin snips and file edges smooth. This piece is then bent to grip candle. Tin holder is nailed to swivel base. Handle completes the holder. Paint scallops and handles red.
