Mystery-Drama At Capitol, S'side

Warner Bros.' new mystery-drama which opened at the Capitol Theatre yesterday, has all the basic requirements for a successful mystery story. It has a well-constructed plot, a high suspense content and excellent acting. It is jammed full of unusual circumstances which fall to disentangle themselves until the very last scene and is calculated to keep audiences guessing right through to the end of its hour of continuous action and suspense.

"Find the Blackmailer" is the story of a candidate for the Mayorship of his home town who is being framed by the brother of the girl to whom he is engaged. This girl's brother has a five-year jail record and if the news should be made public it would ruin the chances of the aspirant mayor.

A novel twist is given the story when a search for a talking blackbird who disappears after a murder is committed, becomes the object of the search for prima facie evidence in the case. Gene Lockhart, who portrays the aspirant mayor, does not want anyone else to find the birds because he has reason to believe that its master (the murderer) taught it to say, "No! Don't kill me. Rhodes!" for the purpose of blackmailing him.

He hires a private detective to find the bird and when it is finally discovered under most unexpected circumstances the plot is climaxed in a novel manner that will surprise everyone who sees the picture.

Gene Lockhart does a convincing characterization of the political-minded man and impetus is given the fast-moving story by the able performances of Jerome Cowan as the private detective and Faye Emerson as the murdered man's girl friend. Praise, too, to Marjorie Hoehle, Robert Kent, Wade Boteler and John Harmon who appear in the supporting cast.

D. Ross Lederman's able direction makes the most of Robert E. Kent's screen play, maintaining an element of suspense throughout the picture.

OFF SECRET LIST



Officially, this tough member of the Allied mechanized forces is known as the 15 cwt. armored truck. Actually, it can be used as an emergency ambulance or an all-purpose load carrier as well as a battle wagon. Rolling on heavy-duty pneumatic tires, it can speed through underbrush, sand and shallow bogs, water and demolition rubble, carrying a good complement of men behind its heavy armor coat. The Canadian firm making the truck as a battle wagon, has already turned out more than 2,000 of them. Until recently this vehicle has been on the secret list.

DEMURRAGE CASE - Judgment was delivered recently by Judge C. St. Clair Trainor of the County Court of King's County in the case of the Canadian National Railways Company vs. Quigley and Son, St. Peters. The action was brought by the plaintiff for demurrage charges assessed by the Demurrage Bureau against a refrigerator car held over longer than two days by the defendant in the loading of potatoes. Judgment was delivered in favor of the defendant with costs. E. R. Bell represented the defendant and George J. Twesley, K. C. the plaintiff. The defendants contended they were not liable for the extra days as the delay in loading was caused by inclement weather. The trial judge found that the temperature during the period was below that at which potatoes could be safely loaded and that the defendant had not delayed in the loading but had loaded at the earliest opportunity that offered.

FOR NAVY WEEK - In connection with the observance of Navy Week, which opens on Sunday next, a 24-foot lighthouse has been erected on the north side of Market Square with a regular flashing light on top. This is one of twelve which are being erected at strategic points across Canada from Charlottetown to Vancouver. A loud speaker is being erected over which will be heard an address by Navy Minister Macdonald this evening about 8.45, when all lights will be turned on simultaneously across Canada. Mr. David Gibson, C.B.E., president of the Navy League of Canada, will also be heard in addition to band music from Toronto. The band of H.M.C.S. "Cornwall" is arriving here Wednesday night and citizens will be given an opportunity of hearing this famous top-notch musical aggregation. The lighthouse, on an 8-foot base, has on two sides the inscription "Navy League of Canada, Navy Week, Nov. 19th to 23rd" and is attracting much favorable attention.

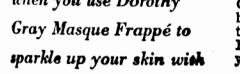
