OTTAWA, April 13—(Special)—A Charlottetown officer, Lieut.-Col. James Reginald Stewart, M. B. E. has been appointed to head the military police force of Canada's postwar army, it is announced from National Defence Headquarters.

Col. Stewart, who has more than six years overseas service to his credit, will be Provost Marshal of the new corps of 130 officers and men to be stationed at garrison centres across the Dominion. Born and educated at Charlottetown, Col. Stewart joined the Royal Canadian Mounted Police prior to the outbreak of hostilities.

After V-E Day, Col. Stewart remained with the Canadian occupation forces in Germany and returned to Canada early in 1946. He will make his headquarters in Ottawa in his new post but will travel widely to the various posts of his unit and to detention barracks in different parts of Canada.

Other Appointments

Two other Maritimers were named to senior posts in the Provost Corps at the same time as Col. Stewart was given command of the branch. They are Major A.J. Gillis, M.B.E. of Margaree Forks, Cape Breton who will be Assistant Provost Marshal for the Central Command, and Capt. J.M. Walsh of Sydney, N.S. who will be Assistant Provost Marshal for the Eastern Command.

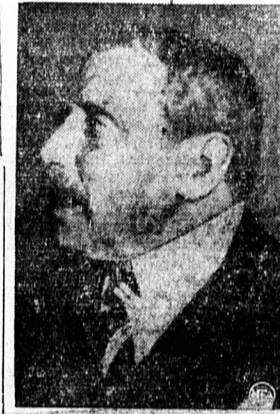
Potato Exports Up 30 Per Cent Over Last Year

Hopes To Cut 30 Hours Off Existing Mark

KARACHI, India, April 14—(Monday)—(Reuters)—Milton Reynolds' round-the-world plane, the Bombshell, landed at Karachi airport at 3:02 a.m. GMT (10:02 p.m. Sunday EST) after a flight from Cairo.

Reynolds, Chicago pen manufacturer, and his pilot Capt. William Odem of Roslyn, N.Y., took off from LAGuardia Field in New York City at 5:11 p.m. (EST) Saturday. They hoped to return to New York between 10 p.m. and midnight Monday.

They are attempting to lower by more than 30 hours the mark of 91 hours and 14 minutes set by Howard Hughes on his flight in 1931. Reynolds said he hoped to make it around the globe in 60 hours, despite the fact his course is 6,000 miles longer than Hughes'.
