Over in England, and among many here in Canada, United States' opinion is gauged by the articles and editorials in able and informed newspapers in the eastern States.

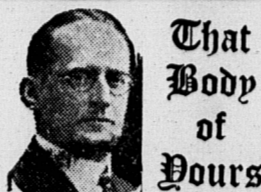
The important feature in connection with the new tariff arrangements in Great Britain so far as Canada and the Empire are concerned, is that the new duties will not apply to Empire products.

YOU CAN DRINK TOO MUCH WATER

When a health writer points out that liquids are a big factor in causing overweight, immediately the question is asked 'Isn't water good for me; doesn't it wash out wastes in the intestine and kidneys, and isn't it needed for a great many purposes in the body, in fact isn't the body made up of more than two-thirds water?'

It is quite true that water is needed and that most of us do not drink enough of it, but it does increase weight in fat folks because the tissues can hold more water.

As water is 'good' for them a number of people are now drinking quarts, in some cases one or two gallons of water a day, thinking that the more they drink the better health they will enjoy.

Now it is a good thing for the blood vessels to have sufficient fluid in them. It gives the heart something to pump and that keeps its muscular walls strong.

Remember that three and four extra glasses of water a day is helpful, but more than this in many cases may be harmful.

An Islander Who Ploughed New Furrows Of Education

It is an appropriate coincidence that the twenty-fifth celebration of Founder's Day at Macdonald College on Saturday Feb. 13, should fall within the same week and follow by only three days the one hundred and first anniversary of the birth of the founder, the late Sir William Macdonald.

It is 1898-99, in fact before that Sir William Macdonald had been most anxious to help to improve rural schools in Canada, and he sought to help in the way of planning and administration.

It was at the little village of Glensdale, P. E. I., that William Christopher Macdonald was born on February 10th, 1831, 101 years ago today, his father, Hon. Donald Macdonald, descendant of a Highland Jacobite family which came to Canada after the failure of the rising of 1745.

"Funds were provided," he writes, "by Sir William C. Macdonald, of Montreal, to promote manual training, seed grain selection, school gardens, nature study and household science, as parts of a movement to assist in building up the country in its boys and girls.
