HFX. YACHT CLUB MAPS CAMPAIGN

HALIFAX, April 10—(Canadian Press)—Thirty-seven races are scheduled for the summer season in a programme mapped out by the committee of management of the Royal Nova Scotia Yacht Squadron. Tourists and citizens for the first time will be able to see the yachts in action from the shore, for it is announced that races will be held inside the harbor. This decision was made because of increased interest shown by the public in club events recently. The Stipe boat races on St. Patrick's Day last, held in the inner harbor, were viewed by thousands. The first race in the series of annual events will be on June 21; Halifax's annual day for the Cornwallis Cup. It will be a general handicapped contest and the course will be from the Yacht Squadron breakwater up the harbor to Black Point buoy, near Tull's Cove and return. Larger yachts are now getting their boats in readiness. Under a new rule all yachts must be launched by May 15.

Canadian Pair Pressed Hard In Bike Grind

PARIS, April 10—A great variety of new and unusual materials distinguish the collection shown by Alk Barton. The beach clothes have a barbaric touch that is original and amusing. 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INCREASE IN MINING INVESTMENTS

By Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, April 10—Increase of more than \$1,000,000 in investment values in winter mining companies is reported by mining corporation of Canada Limited for year ended Dec. 30, 1933. 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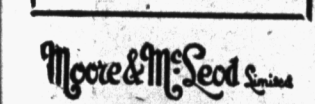
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
