**Senate Committee Supports Request**

(By The Canadian Press)  
 OTTAWA, March 10—The Senate Immigration Committee today went on record as supporting a request that Chinese residents, whether citizens or not, be allowed to bring their wives and children into the Dominion.  
 The motion followed presentation of a brief by an eight-man delegation from the committee for the repeal of the Chinese Immigration Act, which urged repeal of order-in-council P. C. 2115.  
 Under this order only Chinese who have become Canadian citizens are permitted to bring their families to Canada. It came into effect last year following the lifting of the Chinese Immigration Act, which with minor exceptions, had barred all persons of Chinese origin from Canada.

**N. Z. POLIO EPIDEMIC**

AUCKLAND, N. Z. — (CP) — Restrictions in effect during the current infantile paralysis epidemic were lifted throughout New Zealand Feb. 21, but were re-imposed in Auckland and South Auckland health districts two days later after the outbreak of several new cases. Schools in all but these areas opened at the beginning of March.

**Trinity Men's Association**

The Men's Association of Trinity United Church held their monthly supper meeting in the church hall on Monday evening, March 7th. President T. Roy Gudmore presided and an excellent supper was served to over one hundred members and guests by the Pancy Work and Novelty Table Branch of The Willing Circle of The King's Daughters.

The Guest Speaker of the evening, Mr. J. A. S. Williams, Vice-Principal of Prince Street School, was introduced by Col L. W. Lowther. Mr. Williams spoke on "Teachers — Their Activities and Problems". He gave an interesting outline of the Prince Edward Island Teachers' Profession which comprises 710 members. He paid particular stress to the acute teacher shortage throughout the Dominion and pointed out that early in the war years it was necessary to freeze teachers in their profession, but not before some 30,000 teachers had left their work. Over 7,000 schools at the present time are without qualified teachers. In the Normal Schools across Canada, there are only 7,800 young men and women receiving training for their chosen profession, whereas the estimate required to overcome the deficiency in qualified teaching staff in three years amounts to 10,000. Low salaries, lack of recognition by the public generally and very little security for the future are perhaps the most important reasons for the existing condition in teaching shortage. Mr. Williams quoted from remarks made by Dr. Coppinger, an educational authority, as follows:

"The teacher shortage continues to be a vexed question linked as it is with the lowering of the standard and permitting unqualified, un-certified persons to teach. Salaries are improving but not rapidly enough to stop the loss to the profession of qualified persons. As a whole, we fail to attract the finest personnel which our high schools afford. The public is not sufficiently alarmed at the situation. Some students who have never had a fully qualified teacher are now reaching university level. These will form a part of the Canadian citizens upon whom will rest the responsibility of Canada, to say nothing of world understanding and peace. Responsibility lies upon the parents who have permitted the schools of Canada to degenerate. Never before has there been such great wealth in Canada: never have the schools had a smaller share of that wealth. The struggle for better school conditions must continue for the good of the child. A teacher can escape by quitting. The salvation of the child lies in an aroused public clamoring for direct Federal aid to the schools."

Mr. Williams said that a Pension is a necessity to keep a teacher in his profession so that he will not have needless worry about providing for his old age. Prince Edward Island has been making a creditable number of improvements in this respect and it is hoped soon to have our whole Pension scheme in a sound condition. The Speaker finished his address by referring to an article from an address given by Mayor Haviland some sixty years ago when he said, "Where would you find better schools than we have now? God forbid that any state man should ever arise in this province to do anything that would injure that system in any shape or form. We wish our public schools to keep pace with this enlightened age." Are we keeping pace with other provinces?

The Hon. A. W. Matheson, Provincial Legislative Assembly member, thanked the Guest Speaker at the conclusion of his address.
