Former Islander Dies In Quebec

Word has been received of the death in McMasterville, Que., on the evening of October 14th of H.B. Haslam, a lifelong resident of Springfield, P.E.I. He was 71 years of age.

The late Mr. Haslam has been spending the last few winters with his son, Dr. Louis Haslam in McMasterville but until this year, when prevented by ill health, always spent his summers in Springfield. On last Tuesday he took a sudden turn for the worse and his sons, Irving and Clarence of Springfield, left immediately for McMasterville and were with him when he died.

The late Mr. Haslam was married twice, first to Margaret Walker of Kensington and from this union there was one son, Dr. Louis Haslam, mentioned above. His second wife was Blanche Abbott of Brookfield who predeceased him in 1943. There were three sons from the second marriage, Irving and Clarence in Springfield and Raymond in McMasterville. He is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Goldie Abbott in British Columbia and Mrs. (Dr.) Frank Pedley, Montreal; also a brother, Everett Haslam in Springfield. He is also survived by eight grandchildren.

The body will be brought home accompanied by the four sons and the funeral service will be from St. Elizabeth's Anglican Church, Springfield of which the deceased was a valued member. The time of the funeral will be announced later.—S.

ROYAL COMMISSION (Continued from Page 1) ment that it was unfair to the Canadian consumer to omit the non-railway earnings of the Railways from consideration in determining their corporate needs. Their presentation had also the effect, the Premier said, of temporarily shelving the request of the Railways for an additional 20-per-cent freight increase so that, before next January, when a decision is to be made on the 15-per-cent interim increase, the Province of Prince Edward Island will have saved half a million dollars. The Premier said that the appointment of a Royal Commission to study the Canadian transportation problem was another admission on the part of the Dominion Government of the soundness of the presentation made by the Provincial Premier. But only the appointment of a Royal Commission with the authority to review the whole question in all its phases would be entirely satisfactory, the Premier said.

RUSSIAN GUNS (Continued from Page 1) in manoeuvres and was about three miles away. A senior American airforce officer declared the firing definitely was not from anti-aircraft guns. He identified its sound as ground artillery fire. British and American planes taking off from Gatow on the air lift passed directly over where the shells were bursting less than 200 feet from the ground, an official British announcement said. The British recalled that both last year and in 1946 Russian tank shells landed on the outskirts of Gatow. An old German training area, it is about three miles west of the field. British officials, who reported the firing to a Soviet representative said there was no anti-aircraft firing by the Russians today.

PREMIER MACDONALD (Continued from Page 1) the Nova Scotia Premier in a prepared statement. He cited the railways shipping and communication facilities as being most important because of present conditions and the probable future development of the country. Commenting on the decision asking the Board to consider non-railway earnings in determining corporate needs of the railway companies, the Premier said the provinces have "contended all along that it was unfair to make the railway part of the C.P.R. bear the whole burden" of fixed charges and income taxes. Premier Macdonald became the fourth premier to comment on the 1,200-word order-in-council, passed Oct. 12 and released last night. Premier Manning of Alberta, McNair of New Brunswick and Atorney-General Gordon Wismer of British Columbia commented previously.
