March 20 — (CP) — A picture in Wings Abroad of LAC Murray Garrett resting in the upper bunk of a flying boat in Iceland has solved the mystery of the missing flannel pyjamas for his father back in Toronto, reports the R.C.A.F. overseas news paper.

Garrett senior's pyjamas, with distinctive pink stripes, vanished from the house one day and eventually were given up as lost. "But when we saw the picture of Murray," the elder Garrett wrote in a letter to the editor of Wings Abroad, "the whereabouts of the missing pyjamas came to light."

Mr. Garrett thanked the editor for unshaming them and asked him to "concoct" another photograph showing how it could get them back.

Sqdr. Ldr. Bob Hest of Iroquois Ont. returned from a Berlin raid with only the navigator and the mid-upper gunner on the job in his big, four-engine Halifax of the Leaside Squadron.

On the way to Berlin the oxygen mask of the rear gunner, WO, H.A. Burnett of Edmonton, froze up and he lost consciousness. There was no reply when the mid-upper gunner, PO, Bob Dorland of (14) Bonfield Ave., Toronto, asked Burnett, if he had identified an enemy fighter.

Skipper Hest sent the wireless operator, PO, R.J. Hannaford of London, to investigate and he failed to return. Bomb Almer G.B. Haywood of York, England, went back and then the second pilot, PO, Early Kirk of (15) Beverly Ave., Winnipeg, engineer, Flt. Lt. R.W. Duncanson of Edinburgh.

"When the flight engineer failed to return," I stopped the procession," Hest said, "because there were only three of us left and none of us could leave our places in the ship."

Hest received altitude and made England safely, with two men still out cold and two others "plenty groggy."

Membership in the Boy Scout Movement in Great Britain showed an increase of 50,000 in 1943. Air Scouts at Dayton, Ohio, have presented to Cyril's Wright, inventor of the airplane, a model of the original plane.

A large group of Canadian Scouts, now serving in the armed forces in Britain recently spent a weekend at Hampton Court Palace, where they were entertained by the Dowager Lady Baden-Powell, widow of the Founder of the Boy Scout Movement.

Boy Scout Troops in Nigeria, West Africa, are operating ground-schools. In addition they are assisting in the school garden scheme. The money raised from the sale of produce is mostly invested in war bonds.

London, England, is full of strangers these days, and they find their difficulties infinitely greater when one of London's famous "Pea Soup" fogs settles down over the capital. Passengers alighting at a north London station find they are met by Boy Scouts, who by their knowledge of the district are able to direct tired and bewildered travellers.

Famous Scouts in the news recently are General Sir Oliver Leese, B.C., D.S.O., the new commander of the 9th Army, who was a Scoutmaster at Hatfield, Herts; Sir Noel Mason MacFarlane, Deputy-President of the Allied Commission in Italy, who is an active member of the Scout Movement, and Squadron Leader J.R. Baldwin, D.F.C., and bar, who led the squadron of Typhoons which chased enemy planes around the Eiffel Tower in Paris, is a former Patrol Leader in the 2nd Birchington Boy Scout Troop.

His Excellency, the Governor-General Chief Scout for Canada will celebrate his 70th birthday on April 14th.

Lord Somers, Chief Scout of the British Empire, who recently underwent a serious operation, is reported to be progressing slowly.

Despite the fact that he was wounded in an air raid, Boy Scout Brian Walter Fox of London, conducted his mother and sister to the air raid shelter and then reported for duty at the Warden's Post.

An Italian prisoner of war now in England, and who was a Scout before Mussolini came into power has announced his intention of starting a Scout Troop as soon as he returns to Italy.

The first of 3,000 copies of Lord Baden-Powell's book, Scouting for Boys in the Polish language has been presented to Hon. Victor Podolski, Polish Minister to Canada. These books are the gift of the Scouts of Canada to the Polish organization to assist in its re-education after the war. Similar editions are to be printed in Canada for Belgium, Norway, Netherlands and Czechoslovakia. The project, expected to cost \$12,500, will be borne by Canadian Scouts through voluntary contributions.

His Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester, brother of His Majesty the King, was re-elected President of the Boy Scouts Association of Great Britain recently. Despite the fact he would soon be going to Australia as Governor-General, the Duke expressed a desire to remain as President. He also announced that he would serve as Chief Scout of Australia during his tenure of office in the Common Wealth.

Among members of the Empire forces decorated recently at a Buckingham Palace investiture. The senior R.C.A.F. officer to receive an award was Air Vice Marshal G.E. Brookes of Toronto who was made a Companion of the Order of the British Empire. He is the Wing Cmdr. W.D. (Tiny) Ferris of Edmonton, 33-year-old commander of a Canadian conversion unit and former C.O. of the Goose Squadron, Ft. L. O. H. Morcan of Rosedale, Alta., and FO D.W. Simpson of Stratford, Ont.

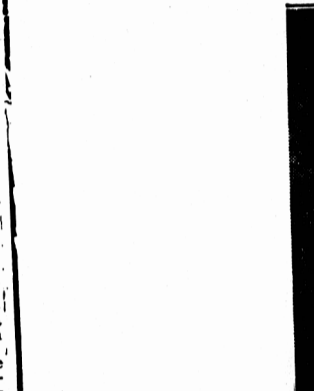

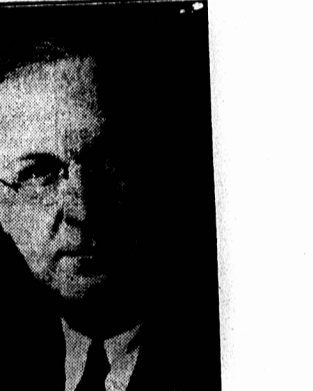

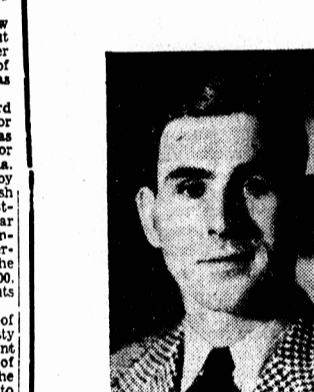
