THE CAPITAL OF THE WEST
Latest from Summerside and Prince County.

A WHOLE team of west end Rangers played against only two of the Crystal Pioneers in a friendly yet bitterly contested game of hockey in Crystal Rink yesterday afternoon and suffered defeat by a few goals.

THE question of waterworks and sewerage for Summerside is again being agitated and an effort is being made to nominate a Board, with this the principal plank in its platform, to contest the coming civic election. Many people favor a plebiscite vote to ascertain public opinion on the question; and while some claim that property holders alone should cast ballots for or against it, there is a strong feeling that non-property holders who have property rented and who in reality pay the taxes on the property leased by them should have a voice in the matter. However a plebiscite now seems improbable at present; and should a Board run on the waterworks and sewerage question, in the event of their election the vote would at least give such a Council a free hand to take some definite action, if only to call citizens together, furnish estimates, have the question thoroughly discussed and later have public sentiment expressed through some form of plebiscite. Such steps are quite reasonable and right; as there are many citizens anxious to see a waterworks and sewerage plant installed, there should be something done to get the views of the rate-payers regarding this important matter.

PRINCE TOWN congregation has an organized history of over ninety-five years and records covering that period of time. At the annual meeting recently held Hon. Peter McNutt, Chairman of the Board of Managers, said he had much pleasure in presenting a very satisfactory report for 1903. The expenditure was as follows for all branches of Church work:—

Schemes of the Church 699.84
Religious and Benevolent 81.00
Ladies' Aid Society 31.16
Other incidental expenses 42.00
Total \$2016.70

In addition a large amount of voluntary work was given on improving the church grounds. The Ladies' Aid are looking forward to further renovating the interior of the church at no distant date. The session fund reported a balance of \$19.64, and the Managers, after provision had been made for paying for the Manse furnace by the meeting, could report a balance of over \$100. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered the board of Managers, and those retiring were unanimously re-elected.
