Her maiden name was Ellen Cousin, daughter of the late John (Quaker) Cousins. In early life she married Wm. H. Campbell of Burlington, where she lived for many years. About 20 years ago she, with her son, Oliver, moved to Kensington where she has since resided.

A Mother in Israel has passed on to her reward, earth is richer because of her life, and poorer with her leaving, but Heaven is more radiant because of her pure and happy soul. Gracious in hospitality, her home was always open to friends and strangers alike. She had a genius for friendship—her cheerful disposition won for her a host of friends which she held throughout the years.

Possessed with a wonderful retentive memory, she could relate incidents in her early life in a most interesting manner.
