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Another High State Official Murdered Reichers Tells Vivid Story Of Attempted Hop

CROSS WINDS PLAY HAVOC WITH FLIGHT

Lou Reichers Gives Experiences
Of Lone Dash Over Turbulent
Atlantic — Rescued In Nick
Of Time

Lou Reichers, New Jersey aviator, who attempted a trans-Atlantic flight from Newark, N. J., via Harbor Grace, Newfoundland, has written the following story of his journey that ended when he was forced down off the Irish Coast and rescued by the S. S. Roosevelt.

S. S. PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT AT SEA, May 15. (A.P.)—The flight from Newark to Newfoundland was uneventful except for some poor visibility and rain. I received a weather report at Harbor Grace from Harry Connot, chief officer of the Baltimore mail line ship "City of Hamburg," who laid out my course and furnished me with navigation data. He indicated weather O. K. so I refueled and took off. Flying the course Harry radioed me from aboard his ship in mid-ocean. The first hour out was clear and cold and I sighted several ice-burgs. Then low-hanging clouds obscured the sea and for at least four hours I did not see it again. After that I got only occasional glimpses through holes.

"TOOK A LOOK"

When eight hours had passed I came down through a hole to have a look underneath. The visibility was poor and I could see no indication of land, so I climbed up again over the clouds and flew another half hour. I repeated the same performance but still no land and again at nine hours, and at nine and one half there was still nothing but water. I knew then that I had been carried by cross winds either to the north or south of Ireland. Whenever I did spot water I could see from the whitecaps that surface winds were southwest so I assumed my position to be north.

FOREIGN MINERS ARE WEALTHY

Europeans Withdraw
\$200,000 From
Sydney Banks On
Getting Their Notice
Of Dismissal.

SYDNEY, N. S., May 15—The closing of no. 14 colliery, with the consequent termination of employment for numerous foreign-born workers under the company's policy of retaining as many native Canadians as possible, is revealing the resources stored away by the foreign miners, as they draw their money from the bank in preparation for sailing back home.

Although no official figures are obtainable, it is learned that not less than \$200,000 has been withdrawn from the banks for trans-

Trial Load Of Cattle To Old Country

REGINA, Sask., May 15—Finally getting in touch with owners of a suitable ship, the Saskatchewan Department of Agriculture, co-operating with the Federal Department, is negotiating with them to carry a trial load of cattle, great quantities of butter and other farm products to the old country via Hudson Bay, it was announced over the week-end by Hon. W. C. Buckle, provincial Minister of Agriculture and acting Premier, in the absence of Dr. J. T. M. Anderson.

Mr. Buckle also announced that provincial authorities were pressing Ottawa for a further revision of the Hudson rate basis that became effective April 25 last.

CHECK SWINDLE

MONTREAL, May 14. (By the Canadian Press)—A cheque swindle that may involve several thousands of dollars has been detected here and one man has already been arrested. Excellent imitations of Canadian National Railway pay cheques have been honored by several banks within the last day or so, it was learned. The cheques were drawn on the Bank of Toronto but none were cashed by that institution.

The forgeries were discovered when a clerk in the Bank of Toronto noticed a dissimilarity among different Canadian National Railway pay cheques received from the clearing house today. An investigation was promptly started. The Bank of Toronto has already segregated twenty five forged cheques with a total face value of some \$2,200. All had been cashed at other banks.

MOSLEMS AND HINDUS RIOT IN BOMBAY

Casualty List of 24
Dead and 400 In-
jured During Two
Days Of Disorders.

BOMBAY, May 15.—(A.P.)—Troop reinforcements were moved today into disturbed areas of Bombay where a casualty list of twenty-five dead and 400 injured has been piled up during two days of rioting by Hindus and Moslems. Fifty of the injured were in serious condition.

In six different parts of Bombay today the police were compelled to fire into mobs. Late tonight there were no signs that the disorders would abate. The rioters had started stoning temples and mosques and several Hindu buildings, including a four-story tenement, were set afire. Police Commissioner Sir Patrick

Japanese Premier Is Assassinated

Military Terrorists Responsible For Killing—Is Second
Head Of A State To Succumb
To An Assassin's Bullet With-
in a Period of Ten Days.

CABINET RESIGNS

TOKYO, May 16.—(Wednesday)—(A. P.)—The Japanese Cabinet decided to resign following an urgent meeting called this morning. Acting Premier Takahashi left the meeting and proceeded immediately to the Palace to see Emperor Hirohito.

TOKYO, May 16.—(Monday)—Premier Suoyoshi Inukai died shortly before midnight from bullet wounds inflicted by assassin members of a group of military terrorists who were responsible for a series of bombings carried out at the very moment the Premier was attacked.

Bombs were exploded at the office of the Metropolitan Police

Board, the Bank of Japan, the headquarters of the Seiyukai (Government) party and the home of the Lord Keeper of the Privy Seal. At two o'clock this morning a hurried ceremony was held in the palace and the powers of government were transferred to Kor Fyo Takahashi, who has been serving as Finance Minister. Mr. Takahashi was appointed acting Premier.

The assassinated Premier, who was 77 years old, died at 11:25 p.m., almost exactly six hours after he was shot. He was the second head of a state to succumb to an assassin's bullet within a period of ten days. President Paul Doumer of France was killed in the same manner.

NEW YORK, May 15—The New York Times says police have information the Lindbergh baby was kidnapped and slain by a gang of five men and one woman whose identities are believed to be known to New Jersey authorities. The arrest of one or more of them is expected within a few days.

RECONSTRUCT CRIME

On the basis of information furnished by Dr. John P. Condon, the "Jafsie" of the \$50,000 ransom payment, and by Morris Rosner, undercover intermediary, the paper says, state police have been able partially to identify the criminals and to reconstruct the first coherent picture of the crime.

Co - Pilot Of Lindy Killed
