MALONE, N.Y., July 23.—With characteristic energy and enterprise Jack Flanagan, chief host for the town of Malone, has undertaken to have the Prince of Wales visit this centre after he reaches Montreal on his Canadian tour. At a meeting of the local Chamber of Commerce Mr. Flanagan, who is well known to the tourists who recently visited Malone on The Journal inter-city good roads automobile reliability tour, was delegated a committee of one to take all steps to secure a visit of the heir to the British throne. It is proposed to have the Royal visitor, Prince of Wales, visit from The Ottawa Journal tour in June. If necessary, Mr. Flanagan will go to Ottawa to interview the authorities with a view to having a side trip to Malone, as a part of the itinerary for the Prince of Wales. It is suggested that the Prince of Wales could dedicate the Theodore Roosevelt international memorial highway of which the improved Prescott highway to Ottawa is to be a branch line for transcontinental voyagers.
