SPAIN'S KING IS ILL.

MADRID, Oct. 24.—King Alfonso is fatally ill, according to a statement of a high medical authority here today, with a disease described as "carries of the bone." A fatal termination is feared in the near future.

The complaint involves the decay of the bone. Dr. Mourne, the celebrated Bordeaux scientist, to whom Alfonso has made frequent visits of late, has been able only slightly to retard the progress of the disease. One of the King's ears has been affected for a long time and the bones of one cheek and same side of the nose are now gradually disintegrating.

DAMAGE IS NOT GREAT.

KEY WEST, via Havana, Oct. 21.—The damage done by the storm in Key West was not so great as at first thought. Business has been resumed, and all the cigar factories are working.

The constructing engineer of the East Coast Extension says that the work at North Knights Key has not been severely damaged. The equipment is practically uninjured, but several temporary trestles were broken down by floating debris, which will prevent the operation of the regular train for a week or more. More serious damage was done to the line between Key West and Boca Chica.

The steamer City of Texas will take the remaining passengers from the stranded steamer Louisiana to Havana direct.

FRENCH AVIATOR KILLED.

DOUAI, France, Oct. 23.—Capt. Madiot, a military aviator, was instantly killed at the Aerodrome here today. He was making his first practice flight at the course and, when at a height of 100 feet, tried to stop his motor, and bring the plane to the ground. The motor continued to run and the machine plunged to the earth the aviator's skull being crushed.

condition as that existing at death but if relaxed its emptiness might be due to putrefaction. Extreme hypertrophy shows an increase in size and weight of the heart. To Mr. Stewart—If a person got a blow in the solar plexus and death resulted from shock I would expect to find the right cavity of the heart not empty except when extreme shock produces a tetanic contraction of the heart. Any stimulus or injury will produce a muscular contraction and if death occurs before relaxation the heart would undoubtedly be empty. In cases of shock the blood leaves the arterial side of the circulation and enters the nervous side and this consists of all the veins in the right side of the heart. There is not very much difference in the old and more modern theories.

If heart was found empty and contracted and not from gaseous pressure I would assign sudden death to apoplexy, instantaneous death, or mechanical injury.

To Mr. Stewart—A heart cannot be contracted and at the same time dilated.

Victor, Hudson, Stanhope, (aworn), I was away from home two years, in 1907 and 1908. I am twenty-five years old. My farm is on the East side of the Stanhope lane and my aunts live on the west side. Both dwellings are near the lane, about one hundred yards apart. I have been putting in and taking out the greater part of the crop for my aunts, also plowing, rearing, &c. They have a horse. We worked both farms together. My aunt spoke of some four cattle I bought last summer from them. These cattle were in a flock running at large. After paying for cattle I had to catch them. I drove them into a pen in my yard with the other young cattle. I told them the day before I had sold the cattle and would put them all in the pen, take out the ones I was selling and keep the others enclosed so they would not follow. The cattle were about 1/2 mile past Mrs. McMaster's place. They were in their yard as I went by with the cattle and they wanted me to drive the cattle into their yard. They followed us down to our house and we had got the cattle into the yard. They came over and tried to get the cattle out of the yard. They started to take down the bars and

make an attempt to put the cattle out. I stopped them and put up the bars. My mother came out and in the meantime they tried again to get the cattle out. They took the bars three or four times. They were talking loud all the time. I ran over and gave Johanna a shove and she fell down. I don't know whether I touched Mrs. McMaster's or not. That was all I did. They got their cattle home later. I put in all last year's crop but the turnips for my aunts. I got the land ready. I got no regular wages for this. Once in a while they gave me something. I went to their house one night after I had retired on hearing them calling out murder. I went over to see what was the matter. I always helped them out. On Oct. 4th I went to Johanna's shortly after dinner. Johanna was home. I was talking to her. I sat down in the house and talked with her. There was no disturbance then. I was going to plow that afternoon and intended to do their plowing later. They have a horse and we used it with mine on both farms. They had talked she went out. There was not an angry word spoken. I sat down for a while and then went to their gate and when there I saw her 100 yards down the road, toward the shore. She had her two arms outstretched. I suspected something when I saw this. I went down across the road and crossed the fields to my own field. There I saw Mrs. McMaster with a cabbage in each hand and about 50 or 100 yards from the main road. When I got near she laid the two cabbages down and I sat down on the grass. She said that before leaving home she intended to pay me for them. I said "Aunt Lizzie you know there was no need for stealing those cabbages." She said she would pay for them. I refused to take it and told her to go home. This was in the field. I never kicked her. I swung the cabbage at her and told her not to do that again. I did not follow her to her house. I went home by the road. I was behind her. That was all that happened then. I went home with the cabbage and told my grandmother. I had missed things before. They are not poor people and are a great deal better off than my mother and I. I went up to Johanna's then to get the horse, when near there I discovered that some of my sheep were in my aunt's field. I went to the field past their house and I couldn't see the sheep. I decided to go back and get the horse. I went through the fields to the barn. Went into the stable and took out the horse. I had not met Johanna after she left the house before. I started to go home with the horse. As I got to the house they were both in the yard. Johanna was in a rage and talked pretty loud. I don't remember what she said. Then she walked to the woodpile and picked up a stick. She did not attempt to strike me. I asked them for the harness and then tied the horse to the fence. They had then gone into the house. I then went to the back door to get the harness but it was fastened inside talking very loud. I had heard their loud talk so often I did not pay any attention to it and don't remember what they said. I went to the window next to the front of the kitchen and asked for the harness. I got a reply. She said, "Go to hell!" I went to the front of the house. There was an old mat on the window and I pulled it off. There was a board fastening it on and perhaps it came down with the mat. Johanna was near the window with a stick. I told her I would go in after the harness if she didn't give it. She poked the stick out of the window and said I wasn't to get it. I backed up from the window four or five yards and laughed at her. She got crosser still. I went back again and I pulled the stick out of her hands and threw it down. I had no other stick in my hands that day. I did not use a stick on Johanna that day. She turned around and left the window and I started to get the back thinking I was going to get the harness. I heard Lizzie call me to go for my mother as she believed Jo was dying. I said mother's not home. She then said to go for your grandmother. She was lying and laying between the front and back room of the main house. I went for my mother and afterwards went for the doctor. Court adjourned at five o'clock until eleven o'clock this morning.

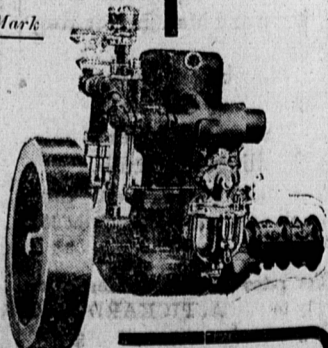
