**Canada Does not Benefit**

(Continued from Page Two)

I see no reason in the world why on a mere argument of justice and right we should not have prevailed on the French government to give us the same tariff as is given to the United States. That being done, then what we were after would have been secured.

Now, the minister according to his claim—and I think he is right so far as I have been able to examine the treaty—has placed this country in respect to some of our exports to France, in the same position as the United States. But he has given in return for that concessions which not only tie our schedules but which "throw out of line" vast sections of our tariff, making us compulsory on this country to impose heavy duties upon necessities that we must import, and at the same time putting at a very low level indeed the duties on luxuries that ought to be taxed away above the levels of necessities.

The minister says in explanation: I had to put low duties upon luxuries because those are what France sells. I know those are what France sells. That is where the minister went wrongly about his task. He had his tariff in a position where he was not able to bargain at all. France had her tariff in a position where we had to go to her and say: We want to be on a level with the United States, and if you insist we pay, we will do it. And we have certainly done it. We have placed the duties on silks, velvets, brandies, champagnes, faxes, toilet goods, perfumes, and similar luxuries at a level away below the duties on woolsens, cottons and all those other essential imports on which the duty ought to be the lowest consistent with the continuance of the industry of producing them in this country. Not only has he done this, but he has put the grape and other producers of heavy commodities in a position where they cannot compete. But he intimates in the House today that when the budget comes down he may, by reducing the duties on wines, restore them to a position where they will be on an equality with their competitors in France. There is another concession he has to make, and he's not around the circle then. He'll have to keep on reducing the revenues of this country, on these things we ought to get revenue from, reducing them item by item in order to pay for something that the United States got nothing. There should first have been a revision of the tariff which France raised her duties as to go to France and maintain a high level the taxes on luxuries and still give a preference to France that would have at least secured for us the same position. Not only that, the concessions he has given mean vastly more than what he fully discloses to the House. I venture to suggest that under this treaty he has given just about as much concession to Japan, if not indeed more than he has given to France, and he gets nothing from Japan at all. He has given a concession to Japan on like and other importations, of which he gets large amounts from Japan, which will be very serious for our revenue, and which on other goods will be serious as well in respect of Japanese competition.

I will give another instance where the minister went unarmèd and returns even now without any appreciation of the bargain he has made. It will be observed that in respect of duties on which we get the French minimum tariff, France has reserved a right to give to French dominions and protectorates a better tariff than we get. No objection, of course, can be made to that. I would expect the minister to grant reservation that is all right. We do likewise in this country in respect to Great Britain and any other nation of the Empire that gives us like concessions. But the treaty goes on to make a reservation in respect of any economic arrangement France may enter into with "border states," and the minister seems to feel that that makes no difference. Why, he says, that only refers to a small strip along the border which for trading purposes, is considered virtually as part of France and that a similar reservation was embodied in the previous treaty. Yes, who has decided that was embodied in the previous treaty. But what was embodied in the previous treaty is not here. I have it before me—that there should be a reservation on the part of France in respect to goods granted the minimum tariff applicable not to border states, but applicable only to fifteen kilometres on each side of the boundary. The minister has not incorporated that reservation in this treaty. All the border states may make treaties with France and secure a minimum away below our minimum of France may give them lower duties without any treaty at all. Such reservation applies to Spain, Italy, Belgium, Germany, Switzerland—all those countries are excepted.

France reserves the right to make treaties with all her border states giving them duties below the minimum that we get on this narrow list of articles; she reserves the right to make treaties with her own protectorates on a lower basis; and she reserves the right as well to make treaties
