A BEAUTIFUL CEREMONY.

Only deep devotion to a cause, unquenchable loyalty to an institution, and the feeling that one should never forget his brothers, only these qualities, combined in the membership of the Independent Order of Oddfellows, could have introduced the beautiful Decoration Day services, which will take place tomorrow when the Oddfellows of this City will turn out to pay tribute of respect to their dead.

As the simple yet impressive ritual is read all will deeply feel the solemnity of the occasion. Then as the floral wreaths are placed by loving hands on the grassy mounds which mark the resting places of the departed—spots that are sacred and dear to all Oddfellows—they will be forcibly reminded of the brevity of life and the certainty of death; for, perhaps hands which tenderly and reverently lay the flowers on the graves tomorrow may next year be crossed beneath the soil.

NEWSPAPER INFLUENCE.

In reviewing the work of the Royal Commission which lately enquired into the South African war stores scandal the Montreal Herald considers the report "a surprising reminder of the services that may be rendered to a community, or to a whole nation, by a newspaper's laying itself open to an action for libel. The entire war stores scandal was raised by The Times by way of a libel suit in which that paper was acquitted in \$1,200 damages. It would probably have been quite impossible to open the matter up in any way that would not have involved a libel on someone, for the newspaper is declared from the investigating rights and the privilege of statement that belong to the lawyer in court. But the publicity that the newspaper alone can give is indispensable to the awakening of public opinion that must precede such court investigations; and as in this case many a newspaper that is convicted of a technical libel is really performing a creditable and necessary service to the country. There are two ways of avoiding libel suits, one is never to say anything that is not right, the other is never to say anything."
