MASCULINE AND FEMINE BONES

There is no doubt whatever that girls infinitely prefer working for a man than for a woman employer. Men are, as a rule, far less exacting. They do not worry about the petty details which the average woman employer seems to think of such tremendous importance, and above all most men give their girl employe credit for a certain amount of personal initiative, until they discover that she has none, in which case she usually is replaced by somebody who has! But a woman will give the most minute and detailed instructions to her clerk, or stenographer, or whatever her employe may be, leaving absolutely no loophole for initiative, or any sort of originality, and quite frequently she will complain that "the girl is a mere machine," and that she takes no interest in her work! How can she, when what interest there might be is all carefully ruled out?

Of course there are exceptions, but taken as a whole, women employers have too little faith in their employes, and are too fond of continual supervision.

Only the other day an incident occurred in a tea-room, where I happened to be lunching, which brought this fact very clearly before me. As is usual, the supervisor, who looked after the waitresses and the general conduct of the dining-room, was a woman. I noticed that my own waitress, a pretty, bright-faced girl, seemed ill at ease, and nervous. She forgot several things and kept me waiting an unreasonable time while she fetched them. Being in a hurry this was annoying, and I was going to remonstrate, when I saw the reason. "The boss" was watching the girls with eagle eyes. Something had gone wrong. Presently she addressed my nervous little attendant, and her voice, though perfectly quiet and level, would have chilled a stouter heart. I knew there was a bad time ahead, though she merely asked a question concerning one of the other girls. The pretty little waitress gave an evasive answer, and the mighty one rose and swept through to the kitchen. It was all about some trivial thing, some omission by one of the waitresses, but it had the effect of paralyzing the whole staff, because "the boss" showed quite plainly that she did not trust one of them.

Women employers have a lot to learn if they intend to make the girls want to work for them. They must treat their subordinates as something better than machines; they must give them the benefit of supposing that they have minds and brains, and know how to use them. 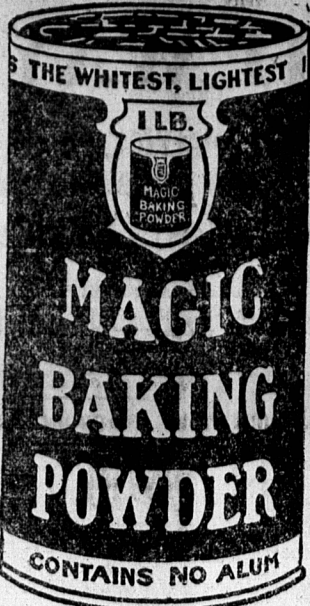

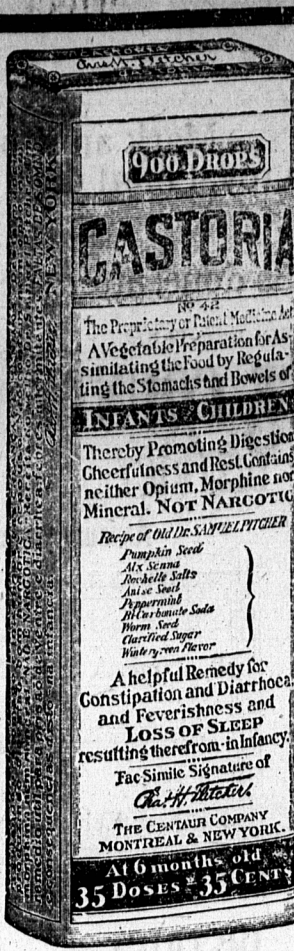
